

Dance With Me (2019) d. YAGUCHI Shinobu 矢口 史靖

Shizuka (MIYOSHI Ayaka) is slowly climbing the corporate ladder at a big trading company in Tokyo while trying to keep her crush on her handsome, charming boss a secret. Envious of her lucky-in-love friends, she decides to visit a fortune teller to find out if she'll ever get married. On her way there, she crosses paths with a young girl on her way to see a hypnotist (TAKARADA Akira), desperate to cure her shyness so she can star in her school musical. But when they arrive, the hypnotist confuses the two, cursing Shizuka to dance whenever she hears music-whether it's on public transport, in a board meeting, or whenever a mobile phone rings! With an important meeting coming up, Shizuka is desperate to break the curse, so she embarks on a cross-country hunt for the shifty hypnotist, dancing the whole way.



Masquerade Hotel (2019) d. SUZUKI Masayuki 鈴木雅之

In this adaptation of Keigo Higashino's best-selling novel, Detective NITTA Kosuke (KIMURA Takuya) goes undercover in a high-end Tokyo hotel after a code of numbers found at three seemingly unrelated murders lead him to believe the next murder will take place there. When he's assigned the front desk, hotel employee YAMAGISHI Naomi (NAGASAWA Masami) is not happy. She's dedicated to upholding the highest standards for guests of the hotel, and prioritises their safety and comfort above all else. However, Kosuke's scruffy appearance and single-minded focus on his detective work are not exactly front desk material. She's going to need to clean up his act, and fast, because every guest and staff member is a potential suspect in the case. The two will need to set aside their differences if they want to come out unscathed, but will they be able to learn to work together before the killer strikes again?



The Fable (2019) d. EGUCHI Kan 江ロカン

He can kill anyone in six seconds. As his nickname implies, the Fable (OKADA Junichi) is an enigmatic assassin who terrorizes the underworld. The overworked assassin gets an order from his boss. "Live the life of a normal man for one year. Kill anyone during your vacation and I kill you." In incognito, the Fable is given the name, "SATO Akira" and his partner is "Yoko" (KIMURA Fumino). They start their new lives as a regular brother and sister with a pet parakeet and part-time work, etc. The assassin begins to enjoy a normal life with no body counts but troubles come looking for him. Other assassins are after him and others need his help. The Fable must survive a life-or-death situation without killing anyone. Can he ever get his peaceful life back ...?



Leading up to the Japanese Film Festival (JFF) 2020, the Japan Foundation, Kuala Lumpur (JFKL) will be starting off the season with a pre-festival event before the actual festival happens in October. With the theme of "Reimagining Short Films, Reinventing Southeast Asia," it is an invitation for Southeast Asian filmmakers to come together, to share our visions and stories that are both unique and yet familiar to each other, and to weave the future narrative of the region while constantly challenging the idea of what a short film can be in today's media landscape.

The 17th International Conference on Japanese Language Education in Malaysia



Jointly organised by the Malaysia Japanese Instructors Society (MAJLIS), Ambang Asuhan Jepun (AAJ) University of Malaya, and The Japan Foundation, Kuala Lumpur, this annual conference will be conducted via ONLINE platforms this year with the aim of supporting research and development of Japanese language education in Malaysia and overseas.

The organisers are now calling for participants to join the Keynote Lecture and other programs.

[KEYNOTE LECTURE]

COVID-19 has drastically changed the composition of the world. Teachers have had no choice but to switch to online lessons within only a few weeks of preparation while students have had to deal with an enormous amount of homework alone. Under such circumstances teachers like you must be thinking; "When can we return to a face-to-face class?" I am as well. Questions like; Why are face-to-face lessons are preferred? Is it because the impact is greater or because, lessons are meant to be conducted in a classroom? – are often asked but challenging to answer.

This year, Associate Professor Dr. YAMADA Tomohisa from HOKKAIDO University will give us an online keynote lecture via ZOOM, entitled "Active Learning in an Online Environment". Dr. Yamada, an ICT specialist for Japanese language education, will share with us his expertise and insights on how Japanese language teachers can provide "Active Learning" environment to the learners using ICT during and after the COVID-19 pandemic.

This seminar will examine the advantages and disadvantages of online and face-to-face lessons, and the key points to be aware of in order to implement active learning during online lessons. The ultimate goal is to be able to conduct face-to-face lessons once COVID-19 is over that integrates the benefits of online lessons

*Keynote lecture will be in Japanese.



Associate Professor Dr. YAMADA Tomohisa is affiliated with Hokkaido University (Center for International Education & Research, Graduate School of International Media, Communication and Tourism Studies).

He received his MA from the Institute of Education, University College of London (UCL) and PhD from Hokkaido University. After working at the Language Center of the School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS), University of London, and the International Student Center of Saga University, he has been in his current position since 2012. His research areas comprise of educational technology and teacher education. Besides his research activities, he is also actively involved in lectures and training activities aimed at improving ICT literacy of Japanese language teachers. He was awarded the Hokkaido University's Excellent Teachers (2014-2017). His main books include "Utilization of ICT (Second Edition)" and "Active Learning for Japanese Language Teachers" (Kuroshio Publishing).

Grant Program for Intellectual Exchange Conferences

Under its grant program, the Japan Foundation has given a grant to the Institute of Malaysian & International Studies (IKMAS), National University of Malaysia (UKM) to hold an intellectual exchange conference during the fiscal year April 2020 to March 2021.

Name of conference to be conducted: Young Scholar Workshop: Localising Sustainable Development Goal #11 and Refugee Integration through a Collaborative Model.

Project Outline: Malaysia, Thailand and Indonesia are among the largest host countries of refugees in the Southeast Asian region. As non-state party to the Refugee Convention 1951, these countries share a common trait in refugee protection – not only do they not have a domestic protection framework but they also do not officially recognise refugee status. This project also focuses on Japan which has extremely low number of refugees under its protection compared to Malaysia and Thailand although it is a state party to the Convention and is among the largest donors to UNHCR's operations across the world. The Governments of Malaysia, Thailand, Indonesia and Japan are committed to implementing the SDGs by 2030. Despite remarkable achievements in many areas of the SDGs, some segments of the population like refugees have been left behind, and not integrated into the successful narrative of sustainable development, This project aims to bring together young scholars from Malaysia, Thailand, Indonesia and Japan to exchange views and innovative models of collaboration to strengthen efforts to localise the SDG Goal #11, namely "Sustainable Cities and Communities", and relate that to issues, challenges and opportunities to better integrate the refugee community in a way they can positively contribute to its actualisation. This in turn will shape positive public opinion and help in strengthening integration between the hosting society and the refugee community.






Title: Teacher Training Programme: Online Discussion Sessions about "Online Class"



With the spread of Covid-19, the education sector is moving forward to transform the traditional classroom into a virtual one via various online platform. A lot of teachers are facing difficulties in conducting the classes online. Some teachers managed to cope with the new norm with several trials, but some are still searching for ways to start.

We, the Japan Foundation, Kuala Lumpur (JFKL) saw the need for the Japanese language teachers to exchange information, to get some insights about how to conduct online classes, and to gain know-how to overcome the difficulties. Thus, we have conducted a series of teacher training programmes specifically targeted to help them with online classes.

Unlike previous JFKL teacher training programmes which consisted of lecture and workshop, this series mainly focused on discussion among participants who are Japanese language teachers. In other words, the main objective is to provide a virtual discussion platform for teachers to share and exchange their difficulties as well as to find a solution together.

This series of online discussion covered 4 topics revolving around the theme, "Online Class".

・Session 1 "How do you Support Students' Self-Study?"「学習者のセルフ・スタディをどうサポートしてる?」on 23 June (Tue) In Session 1, the participants shared about the tools they used for student's self-study. Other issues discussed included the need to adjust the tools to suit the exercise objective, the student's study motivation and age. They also talked about how to sustain that motivation, and encourage interaction between students during self-study.

·Session 2 "How do you Correct Essay?"「作文の添削って、どうしてる?」 on 24 June (Wed)

In Session 2, many teachers voiced out the difficulty of giving feedback in an interactive way when correcting their student's essays. Some of the teachers suggested the method of peer-learning, in which the students are asked to comment on each other's essay. This would enable students who made comments to realise and take note of the mistakes made by their friend.

·Session 3 "How do you Conduct Live Lesson?"「ライブレッスン、どうしてる?」 on 30 June (Tue)

In Session 3, the teachers talked about the types of class activity that are suitable for Live Lesson. The duration available for Live Lesson is limited compared to a physical class. The teachers found that their students had problems focusing when classes were conducted online. Many teachers were still struggling to do pair work and conversation activities effectively online.

·Session 4 "How do you Evaluate (Test/Exam)?"「評価(テスト・試験)ってどうしてる?」 on 1 July (Wed)

In Session 4, the teachers discussed about how to do tests and exam evaluation online. The main concern was how to avoid cheating or plagiarism. Some teachers suggested that the possibility of copying may be solved by lowering the percentage of written tests occupied in the whole assessment, raising the percentage of oral tests percentage, or using some other assessment method.

All together, a total of 93 teachers from various educational institutions (secondary schools teachers, university lecturers, private institution educators, etc.) participated in all 4 sessions. Each session was held for a duration of 90 minutes. Most of the participants felt that 90 minutes was not enough as they really enjoyed sharing their problems and finding solutions together. In each fruitful 90 minutes discussion, the teachers were able to share their difficulties, exchange good ideas, and get insights from each other. We at JFKL hope that via these online discussion sessions, the ideas and insights could be put into practical use by the teachers when they conduct online/offline classes in future.

The sudden requirement to conduct online classes has imposed a lot of pressure on the teachers and students bringing about a change to the traditional classroom where all students gathered at the same location and received knowledge mainly from the teacher. Under the new norm, online self-study plays an important role. This has created a very challenging situation for both students and teachers as they are not used to it yet. Nonetheless, a new way of teaching and learning has come and we must get ready to move a step forward to cope with this unprecedented situation. Last but not least, we thank everyone who has contributed to make this programme a successful one.

6th Batch NIHONGO Partners Report: Short but Meaningful







NP is introducing Japanese culture to students

The 6th Batch NIHONGO Partners Programme was set to launch for eight months, but unfortunately, due to the rapid rise of COVID-19 pandemic, the 25 volunteers from Japan, also known as "NP," returned to Japan two months after they arrived. They arrived in Malaysia in February and were stationed at secondary schools in nine states, Kedah, Pulau Pinang, Perak, Kelantan, Pahang, Selangor, Negeri Sembilan, Johor, Sarawak and Federal Territory of Kuala Lumpur. At the end of March, with Movement Control Order (MCO) being instated, they had to fly back to Japan.

At the end of July, an online report meeting was coordinated by the Japan Foundation for our volunteers. They were able to share experiences and exchange views on what they had planned and done, and it was apparent that despite their short stay, each NPs had experienced moments to be cherished.

Under this programme, the NPs objective is to serve as Japanese language assistants to local language teachers (counterpart teacher or "CP"). At the meeting, the NPs mentioned that they had done team-teaching with the CPs by supporting in-class activities. Besides that, they were involved in creating teaching materials and decorating the classroom. They also supported the students directly by being conversation partners even after classes. They were needed as well at the Japanese Language Club in school which provided more opportunities for them to interact with the students.

The NPs not only promoted Japanese language but the culture as well. They managed to conduct activities like origami, hinamatsuri (girls' festival in Japan), kendama, shodo (Japanese calligraphy), and of course, traditional Japanese food! Some of them captured the students' interests with a more modern approach like interesting places in Japan, popular songs, and the like. Others oversaw the Yosakoi dance practice that their respective schools participate in each year.

They could not finish what they had started and their frustration was apparent, but the NPs attested to their valuable experiences during their short stay in Malaysia. They were gratified that they had been able to promote Japanese language and culture to students who were passionate and appreciative of the lessons. The students asked questions about Japan and even the reserved ones joined in activities conducted by the NPs. Some NPs mentioned that they had been able to experience Malaysian diversity and lifestyle first-hand. They enjoyed their interaction with the local communities and were especially intrigued with the official religion of Malaysia, Islam.

Some NPs noted how this programme had improved their personal practices. They realised the importance of initiating and the need to be more assertive in what they wanted to do. They learned how to be more flexible in class and to account for their students' interests and abilities. These NPs were very dedicated to their role and some of them are still in touch with their CPs and students. Thanks to technology, some managed to introduce Japanese culture like koinobori and Tanabata festivals (both celebrated in May and July respectively) online.

They were touched by the Malaysian hospitality throughout their stay. They experienced kindness from CPs, students, and school staffs especially during MCO. They hope that they can come back to Malaysia to see the students again and this has also driven them to learn Malay while waiting for the opportunity.

We have received positive feedbacks from the host schools involved in this programme in that it had motivated the students to learn Japanese. The presence of native speakers gave them an opportunity to apply what they have learned in class. It will always be a good learning experience not only for students but also for teachers. Many hope that this programme will be continued, and if there is a chance for another batch, they definitely wish to be part of it again.

The Spirit of Budō: The History of Japan's Martial Arts

The Japan Foundation's travelling exhibition, "The Spirit of Budo: The History of Japan's Martial Arts" returned to Malaysia for the second time. This time, it was displayed at Muzium Negeri Terengganu from 20 July until 22 August 2020.

The exhibition highlighted the unique exhibits on the history of Budō. It offered a close-up look at various weapons such as swords, bows and arrows, helmets from suits of armours and many more. Through this exhibition, viewers were able to travel through the history of Japanese martial arts from its emphasis on battlefield combat techniques (bujutsu) to popular sports or physical exercise tempering body and spirit (Budō) in contemporary Japanese society.

This exhibition consisted of two parts: the first presented, reproductions and originals of historical weapons such as bows and arrows, suits of armour, and helmets, and explained the development of Japanese martial arts from the 8th century to 19th century. Many ancient armour and weapons have not survived to this day or are too fragile for international transport which was the reason for including reproductions.

The second part dealt with the evolution of bujutsu to $bud\bar{o}$ in the 19th and 20th centuries, and how the spirit of martial arts is inherent in the daily life of Japanese people to this day. Nine budō associations were also introduced together with the outfits and weapons such as bamboo swords, protectors, bows and arrows used.

For the record, in 2012, the same exhibition was held in Muzium Negara Malaysia.







Budō

Budō, the martial ways of Japan, has its origins in the traditions of Bushid \bar{o} --the way of the warrior. Bud \bar{o} , is a time-honoured form of physical culture comprising of Judō, Kendō, Kyudō, Sumō, Karatedō, Aikidō, Shōrinji Kempō, Naginata and Jukendō. Practitioners study the skills while striving to unify mind, technique and body; develop his or her character; enhance their sense of morality; and to cultivate a respectful and courteous demeanour. Practised steadfastly, these admirable traits become intrinsic to the character of the practitioner. *Budō* serves as a path to self-perfection. This elevation of the human spirit will contribute to social prosperity and harmony, and ultimately, benefit the people of the world (Source: Nippon Budokan official website).
