






JFKL Saturday Half-day Workshop for Teachers

A "JFKL Saturday Half-day Workshop for Japanese Language Teachers" entitled "How to Evaluate Speaking Skill: Criterion for Performance Evaluation (話す力、どう評価する?—パフォーマンス評価の観点—) was held online via Zoom on 5 September 2020.

The topic was chosen based on the results of questionnaires at past seminars and workshops. From the surveys, we noticed that most teachers were interested in the following themes: "Conduct Japanese lesson using ICT", "Evaluation", "New teaching Material" and "Conversation". Although we had conducted an online discussion session regarding "Evaluation" on 1 July 2020, keywords related to the topic such as "Rubric Sheet" and "Performance Evaluation" were not discussed in-depth. Hence, we saw a need for an in-depth lecture, which reflected the real time situation by demonstrating the "Performance Evaluation" using "Rubric Sheets" which are used in classrooms.

The goals of this workshop were as follows:

- •To show that if you set a firm criteria for evaluating learners' performance, you will be able to achieve consistency in setting students' learning goal, planning classroom activity and doing evaluation;
- •To know what you should look for when you conduct an oral examination.

In the workshop, the participating teachers were divided into small groups to discuss the current situation. After that, they gained hands-on experience by doing a performance evaluation using a rubric sheet. At the end of the workshop, they reflected on what they had noticed and learnt through the workshop.

Online Conference Challenge! Looking from the Backyard of ICJLEM 2020

The Journey Begins

ICJLEM – organised by the Japan Foundation, Kuala Lumpur (JFKL), Ambang Asuhan Jepun (AAJ) of Pusat Asasi Sains, Universiti Malaya (PASUM) and Malaysia Japanese Language Instructors Society (MAJLIS) – is held in October every year, with preparations usually beginning in January. However, with the global pandemic and lockdown this year, we had to begin with a discussion of whether it would still be possible to hold this conference in 2020.

We could not disregard the fact that this is a precious once-in-a-year opportunity to gather Japanese language educators, but nobody was able to predict what would happen in six months' time. After much deliberation, we decided that this was the right time to hold it online as it may bring a new perspective in this tough period.

What, and how? - Discussions started to heat up for this very first online conference.

"What is the most manageable method to do this when we are not experts in technology?

Which is the best platform and tool to use, out of so many out there? How many participants should we expect?

How many will present their papers online?

What is the best way to foster interactive interaction in the lecture and during presentations?

Is there a way to encourage participants to stay online with us for a long period of time?"

After exploring the various issues one by one, the outline of the programme was decided about two months later than usual.



Embarking the Journey

Around the globe including Malaysia, face to face lessons seemed impossible and we had to change our initial theme which we had prepared. Associate Professor Dr. YAMADA Tomohisa of Hokkaido University agreed to address the challenges amidst this global crisis in his keynote lecture through the theme, "Active Learning in an Online Environment". We had discussions after discussions through e-mails and ZOOM meetings.

The submissions for oral and poster presentations began in June and since the period had been shortened, we were concerned about the response but in the end, 6 oral presentations and 12 poster presentations were confirmed.

Applications to participate in this conference started in early August. In 10 days, the number of applications approached 100, 20 days later it exceeded 200 and then later exceeded 300! It is impossible to cross the border into Malaysia at the moment, but because it was online, so many people wanted to join! We realised that online

implementation had its own advantages and although we were nervous of this large figure, we were also excited of this new exploration.

On 25 September the poster presentation started on our YouTube channel. Unlike conventional poster presentation where people gather at a fixed time and place, the 'audience' could watch the videos many times, write or read comments and be inspired – a platform for written exchange was created which would not have been possible otherwise. Perhaps, the implementation of an online format which is not tied to specific time or space is suitable for poster presentations after all.

As the conference day approached, 26 staff from all three organisers gathered both physically and online for a rehearsal on 30 September. During this three-hour session, everyone confirmed the overall flow and each role for the actual day. The next day, a technical check was conducted with the keynote speaker and oral presenters.

Final Outcome



The number of applications was 342, which was three times higher than usual, and the number of participants on the conference day was twice the usual number with 190 participants. They were from all over the world including neighbouring ASEAN countries and Japan, as well as the United States, Canada and Russia.

During the keynote lecture, the number exceeded 160 and around 100 participants joined each oral presentation session. The 12 poster presentations have been viewed 2,432 times with a total of 94 comments.

Beginning with a huge question mark, "Would it be possible to hold this online?" we successfully completed the first online version of our International Conference on Japanese Language Education in Malaysia safely. We would like to extend our sincerest gratitude to the keynote speaker, Dr. YAMADA Tomohisa, the oral and poster presenters, and all participants.

We are not sure what new challenges lies in store for us next, but we definitely hope to see you again in the next edition of this conference!

Newly Launched Event: "Online Japanese Salon" for Japanese Language Learners/Speakers in Malaysia

We are currently battling with an unprecedented situation, the Covid-19 pandemic, which has reduced our outdoor activities. We have had to maintain a safe physical/social distance with others, we cannot have large-scale social gatherings... the list goes on. Our life style has changed from the physical to virtual space. Although it is not easy to adjust ourselves to this new norm, we should not stop thinking of new ways to connect with each other.

We also realised that learning a foreign language is a lonely journey now because there is little opportunity to practice the language you have learnt. We feel for you! That is why JFKL has come out with a new event, the ONLINE JAPANESE SALON, which is a virtual space for Japanese language learners/speakers in Malaysia to gather and talk (online)!



What is "ONLINE JAPANESE SALON"?

ONLINE JAPANESE SALON (OJS) is a monthly event for Japanese language learners/speakers in Malaysia to gather and talk via the Zoom platform. Moreover, we will invite some native Japanese volunteers to join in the online conversation as well.

The key idea is to "Have Fun Talking in Japanese"! At this event, you will be able to talk with other Japanese language learners and native speakers in a small group based on a selected theme. You could talk about things in your life that is related to the selected theme, as well as show related photos, pictures, and figures.

This event is open to all Japanese language learners/speakers in Malaysia, from beginner to advanced level. This will be a great chance for you to casually practice (or show off) your Japanese.

The first OJS was launched on 22 August and the second OJS on 17 September with the theme:

「マイブーム」-今、自分の中で一番流行っていること/気に入っていること-

"My Boom" -The thing that I'm crazy about / The thing that I'm interested in-

「マイブーム」/"My Boom" is wasei-eigo (和製英語, "Japanese-made English"). "My Boom" is a phrase without a direct English translation, referring to something experiencing an explosion in popularity. "My Boom" was chosen as our first theme because we believed that it could bring out the curiosity and excitement from our target participants.

We received a very good response from the participants and the first round ended with lots of laughter and fond memories. Following its success, we decided to do a re-run on the same theme, for the second OJS.

Overall, the number of participants was 17 (first session) and 20 (second session) respectively. Most of the participants were college/university students and working adults. As the participants had different backgrounds, we noticed that the stories they shared were very interesting and unique. This diversity created beautiful sparks and made the group talk even more exciting. Each participant

had his/her own story to tell. Some talked about their collection of physical things such as books, games, toys and stationeries. Others about how their "My Boom" in Japanese culture was the impetus to start learning Japanese. Some shared about "My Boom" which they have had since a young age.

As the organiser, we were very happy to see the joyful faces of the participants when they talked about the things that they are crazy about. We could really feel their passions! A big "Thank You" to everyone who joined these events!

We hope that this event will bring a unique and meaningful experience to the participants, as well as provide them with a platform to practice their Japanese speaking skills. Also, we hope this will stimulate the participants to talk more in Japanese in their daily life. JAPANESE LANGUAGE ENTHUSIASTS BY SM SAINS MIRI

SM Sains Miri, Sarawak organised the Japanese Language Enthusiasts (JLE) throughout August 2020 with the support of the Japan Foundation, Kuala Lumpur under its Small Grant Programme and the Ministry of Education Malaysia. JLE offered 6 online competitions targeting not only Japanese language learners under the supervision of their Japanese language teachers in Malaysian secondary schools, but also seeking the involvement of their parents and community as well.

JLE was divided into two phases, each lasting two weeks and spanning the whole month of August. There were two categories, Category A for students 13 to 15 years old and Category B for 16 to 17 years old. Aiming to foster 21st century learning skills such as communication skills, critical thinking and creativity, on top of polishing the students' proficiency in Japanese language, the programme consisted of the following 6 activities:

- 5-min Reading
- Tell-a-tale
- Digital Poster
- Manzai
- VTuber Challenge
- Writing Train

Overall, there were almost 500 participants from 31 schools all over Malaysia.

One interesting feature of the JLE was that the programme was conducted not only by the Japanese language teacher of SMS Miri, but with the assistance of a team of students undertaking various roles including setting up their official website and Discord channel (interactive online platform), official flyer design and event moderators.

The winners of both categories were selected by judges from JFKL with many of them responding that it was quite a challenge to decide on the winners from the finalists as the submissions were impressive and inspiring.

Below are some insights from Ms. Fiona Toh Shu Chew, the main planner of JLE who is the Japanese language teacher of SMS Miri:

What inspired you and SMS Miri to organise JLE?

The necessity to motivate students by boosting their sense of achievement! We also hoped to encourage them to read more Japanese texts to improve their language proficiency so most of the activities required reading skill. With proper guidance and sufficient information, we hope to produce more independent learners.





What are the challenges when organising this project and how did you overcome them?

- 1. Managing it with limited human resource So I saw it as an opportunity to teach students not only language but also other skills like project management, teamwork, leadership and so forth. I hope to train them to be competent individuals in the future.
- 2. Financial burden was also a challenge. JFKL partly supported financially and made the whole programme feasible.
- 3. My own lack of proficiency was overcome with the guidance of the Japanese language expert from JFKL.
- 4. The risk of students not committing enough throughout the programme. I am aware of it, so I monitored closely and worked with them. I gave them sincere and honest feedbacks to help them with their conflicts.
- 5. Overwhelming participation! I did not expect to receive tremendous support from other schools. Their support has made my students excited and wanted to do better. Unfortunately, it caused an issue where we were not able to meet our deadlines as we needed time for voters to review all the submissions. We decided to have more finalists when we saw the high quality of submissions.

What are your hopes for this project and Japanese language education in Malaysia?

SeaShorts Film Festival

SeaShorts Film Festival began as an event to screen Southeast Asian short films, created in hopes of bringing the region closer together through a mutual love for cinema. From humble beginnings in 2017, SeaShorts has grown over the years into a notable regional film festival.

With a programme of handpicked and curated short films, as well as forums and masterclasses, it showcases Southeast Asia's stories and emerging filmmaking talents by bringing together the arts and cultural community from the region. Originally intended to be held in lpoh, Malaysia, the festival was shifted online due to COVID-19.

This year's edition ran from 12 - 20 September 2020, with the theme *Reimagining Short Films*, Reinventing Southeast Asia – an invitation for Southeast Asian filmmakers to come together to share their visions and stories that are both unique yet familiar to each other, and to weave the future narrative of the region while constantly challenging the idea of what a short film can be in today's media landscape.

SeaShorts 2020 saw great support with almost 600 virtual attendees from around the region, clocking in over 22,700 views across its array of programmes, including 52 films, 12 Q&A sessions, 8 forums and workshops, and 5 masterclasses.

This year's competition for the coveted SeaShorts Award saw record-high participation with 544 entries, of which 30 were selected and screened. Malaysian short Peon was the unanimous favourite and took home the SeaShorts Awards for Best Film and the Next New Wave Award for Best Malaysian Film, as well as Best Editing.
