

YU Miri, born to Korean parents and raised in Japan, writes novels, plays and essays. One of her well-known works "Family Cinema" (Kazoku Cinema) was awarded the Akutagawa Prize and her sensational autobiographical best seller, "Life" (Inochi), was adapted into film and is highly esteemed. "Tokyo Ueno Station" (originally published in Japanese in 2014) won the 2020 NATIONAL BOOK AWARD for Translated Literature (U.S).

One of the spots in Tokyo where migrant workers from Tohoku, the northeastern regions, congregate is the park near Ueno Station – Kazu is born in Fukushima in 1933, the same year as the Emperor. He ended up homeless in Ueno Park and finished his life. Now his spirit lingers in the park and narrates his journey which was full of struggles and tragedies in contrast to some of the impressive events that symbolize the era of rapid economic growth in Japan.

With the tagline 'Have Fun Talking in Japanese!', we divided the students into small groups for two rounds. Each round lasted 30 minutes to allow each member of the group to introduce themselves, talk about the theme and also ask each other questions. The lively interactions in each group were led by a native speaker, specifically our previous Nihongo Partners who had been dispatched to Malaysia within the past 6 years to assist local Japanese language teachers in public secondary schools.

Being away from friends and teachers due to school closures, OJS has been an alternative platform for students to continue learning the language beyond classrooms. It has also served as a co-curricular activity for these students as most physical activities in 2020 were cancelled or held with limitation on numbers. Opportunities to converse in Japanese has also decrease relative to when they could gather in schools, hence OJS is seen as a perfect complement to enhance their Japanese language skills, especially speaking and

listening. The simple theme, which provides a broad range for students to talk about, has fostered interesting conversations, varying from the food they like, music and films that they enjoy, hobby, places in Malaysia or Japan that they have been to or would like to visit, to people they look up to!

JFKL would like to thank all participants, their teachers and schools for supporting OJS. Also, a continuous appreciation to the Ministry of Education Malaysia for always encouraging the involvement of their students and teachers in such events.

Strengthen the tie for Japanese Language Education in Malaysia: Annual Coordination Meeting with the Ministry of Education Malaysia for Fiscal Year 2021

The Ministry of Education Malaysia (MOE) through its various divisions has been cooperating with the Japan Foundation, Kuala Lumpur (JFKL) for many years in Japanese language education related programmes involving secondary school teachers and students in Malaysia. To strengthen this rapport and move forward with the improvement plans, JFKL once again organised a coordination meeting with the ministry, by inviting the desk officers in charge of international language in 8 different divisions.

Meeting details:

Date: 12 January 2021 (Tuesday) Time: 10:00 AM to 1:30 PM

Venue: Cititel Midvalley Hotel, Kuala Lumpur

The main purposes of this meeting were:

- To share the initiatives carried out by JFKL to support Japanese language teachers and students in 2020 under COVID-19 and what it is planning to do to provide further support during the next fiscal year.
- To understand the expectations of MOE towards JFKL, in effectively offering support to teachers and students during this challenging period, as well as the projection for upcoming programmes organised in collaboration with the ministry.

JFKL shared the three main types of support we have been offering to various institutions including tertiary level, however in this meeting we focused on our support related to the secondary education level:

1. Support for institutions:

Particularly public secondary schools (both fully residential and daily schools) offering Japanese language as one of the subjects.

2. Support for teachers:

Particularly local Japanese language teachers teaching in Malaysian public secondary schools.

3. Support for learners:

Particularly Japanese language students (Form 1 to Form 5) at Malaysian public secondary schools.

The meeting was also attended by JFKL's Director, Mr. SHIMADA Seiya along with the officers and Japanese language experts in the Japanese Language Department.

Starting with a brief introduction of the Japan Foundation and its Kuala Lumpur office by the chairperson, followed by a welcome speech by Mr. SHIMADA, the agenda items were deliberated thoroughly with optimistic feedbacks by the ministry officers. MOE officers also shared some information from their respective divisions in regard to international language at public schools. There are currently more than 100 public schools in Malaysia offering Japanese language.



The 3-hour session was filled with constructive comments and mutual understanding., and concluded with a luncheon with all members as appreciation for this collaborative work.

Cultivating Environmental-Friendly Habits Through Games

Everyone can recall fond memories of playing games with friends and loved ones at different stages of growing up. It remained a favourite pastime for me up until my study tour when I was selected as a fellow of HANDs – (Hope and Dreams) Project for 'Disaster and Environment Education + Creativity' when the idea of game was embraced to effectively bring about positive change to attain environmentally-friendly habits; this resulted in the collaboration with researcher Lee Kwai Han, artistic director Foo Wei Meng, and myself to create a board game to effectuate a positive change by eliminating addiction to single-use food packaging.

The Birth of JOM TAPAU! Board Game

Tapau, which means to pack and take away food in Chinese dialect, is commonly used by all races in a multi-racial Malaysia. A high-paced lifestyle has resulted in the growing working community to opt for grab and go meals out of conveniences, and the thriving of food delivery service has contributed to an increase in single-use-plastic packaging, to the detriment of the environment.

While the environmental impact of food packaging is widespread and recognised by many, it remains a major issue; behavioural change is essential but arduous. Instead of embracing reusable containers, plastic packaging provided free of charge is accepted out of habit, received disregarding the negative impact to the environment.

With a seed grant from the Japan Foundation, we endeavoured over six months of research, brainstorming, and several playtests to produce the JOM TAPAU! boardgame. This boardgame is designed for 2- 4 players; as players embark on the *Tapau* journey, they have to decide whether to adopt a reusable container and/or single use plastics; every move effects the outcomes as the game advances.

Rather than a traditional classroom setting in which one passively receives information, players actively plan and strategise to take away food in an environmental friendlier manner. As one game tester commented:

- We should plan before we *Tapau* about the nature and quantity of container. Alternatively, we could opt for green packaging, like banana leaf, an environmentally friendly option.

The game is also designed to make people realise that every decision made (mode of *Tapau*) carries an implication to the environment.

- It was a fun session, I enjoyed exploring *Tapau* food and collecting points in the game. I didn't realise we overly used plastic bags in daily life when we Tapau. I mean, I am so used to it that I didn't realise so much was being used, and that it was all going to the landfill.



As the team researched on food packaging it came to light that Malaysians have been adopting many creative ways of using materials sourced from nature, like bamboo leaves, daun simpoh (Dillenia suffruticosa leaves), and the all-time Malaysian favourite banana leaves although they have gradually been displaced by wax paper or single use plastic. These leaves are incorporated in the game to highlight these traditional know-how.

Power of Game Towards Significant Transformation

The project held an online sharing session on 30 January 2021 and received further encouragement when Ms. Ruttikorn Vuttikorn, a renown play activist from Thailand and Mr. Ralph C. Lumbres, HANDs fellow, artist and educator from the Philippines. I successfully presented the session entitled, "Environmental and Disaster Education through Games" which had more than 70 participants.

Despite the overwhelming response at the online sharing session and to the broad game prototype, the team is forging ahead to secure more funding to conduct more playtests, and further refine the boardgame with a hope to empower the game towards achieving actual behavioural change in real-life setting as "educational games are about respect and deep understanding of their audience" – George Kalmpourtzis

Di Situ: An Exhibition

Initially, I joined the Curatorial Workshop in February 2020 with a curious mind to find out what curating was about. At the end of the workshop, I felt uneasy rather than excited, because being selected meant that the proposal now had to be realised. It was a mixed feeling to suddenly embark and commit to a new project.

There were many meet-ups with mentor Mark Teh, JFKL coordinator Kyoko Kugai, comrade Rebecca Yeoh, to help refine the proposal, budget and action plan. What we are finally seeing now in 'Di Situ: An Exhibition', is close to my heart. I appreciate the opportunity to find my own voice in this manner, and it has been very exciting to see it happen.

Di Situ: An Exhibition is about finding the meaning of working in a place, be it our place of living or workplace. Thus, in this exhibition, sites become our entry point in understanding the artist's work, and vice versa. Ultimately we want to invite the viewers to think about their relationships with their sites as well.

While we pushed hard to set-up on-site, we also had to deal with the COVID-19 pandemic. We had to be flexible, from

postponement of the exhibition dates, to rescheduling of programs then actively engaging the audience through various online events – a fragmented experience, but each event culminated in a broader understanding of site-specificity.

In this exhibition, we commissioned new works that responded to the site contexts of Gudang Yee Seng 2 (exhibition venue) and we interviewed artists on their relationship with the site in multiple works. We completed two fieldwork workshops to give first-hand experience of working on-site, we chatted about works that are sited in the forest and ocean of Peninsular Malaysia, zoomed out to artistic practice in various Asian cities, and finally reflected on our own work.

The exhibition has now ended with hope that it has opened up new perspectives on working on-site. Behind this humble journey was tremendous support from The Japan Foundation, Kuala Lumpur, KongsiKL, EXSIM, as well as Di Situ team, artists, friends and neighbours of Gudang Yee Seng 2. "What is going to be the outcome?"

"Why May 13?"

"This is what curating is."

Two questions and one statement to sum up most of the conversations I had this year, in preparation for *May We...* From the start of *May We...*, there was a lot of uncertainty surrounding the exhibition's visual outcome. Although the exhibition's crux was to build on conversations and research with the co-curator and artists, it was challenging to curate the exhibition's physical space at first. Every aspect was imaginative and abstract.

The exhibition went through many changes to adapt to the pandemic situation. Still, the main idea to create conversations about May 13, 1969, out of the fear of forgetting — did not shift. *May We...* may have departed from fear, but the weekly conversations with the participating artists and co-curator revealed multiple intergenerational connections. These were emotions such as fear, discontent, taboo and anxiety. Their investigative approaches shed light on a new standpoint over similar sentiments.

The act of curating **May We...** was multifaceted. It was made more complex due to the pandemic. However, the turbulent year took Pey Sien and I through a journey that enabled us to challenge the traditional notion of 'curating'. The process of curating **May We...** challenged me to consider the site and space of the virtual world and the possibilities of bringing an immersive experience to our audiences in their homes.

A large part of *May We...* involved difficult memories, narratives, histories and fragments of the incident of May 13, 1969. The concept was large yet delicate. Despite the difficulties in attempting to translate emotions and history into mediums of art, there was a sense of urgency throughout the conversations and which was ultimately expressed when the exhibition had to be installed before the State of Emergency began on 13 January 2021.

May We... fell timely in between the two states of emergency. It gave us more room to contemplate our responsibilities as curators and artists who worked to put together an exhibition about May 13, 1969 — the current circumstances we are placed in and the futures it involves.

Prof. Diraja Dr. Ungku Abdul Aziz (1922 - 2020)

On 15 December 2020, we were deeply saddened by the news of the passing of Prof. Diraja Dr. Ungku Abdul Aziz. Known affectionately to many as Pak Ungku, he is, till today, a towering leader to many Malaysians. His strong grasp of multidisciplinary knowledge earned him the name "Renaissance Man", and that led to his game-changing ideas that have transformed the nation

Born on 28 January 1922 in London, he returned to Malaya a few years later to pursue his early education in Johor before heading to Raffles College in Singapore to complete his secondary schooling. He then pursued a Diploma in Arts at Raffles College in 1947 and graduated with a first class Bachelor of Arts degree in Economics from the newly formed University of Malaya four years later. He remained at the university to teach economics.

In 1964, he received his doctorate in Economics from Waseda University, Japan. In 1968, he was promoted to Vice Chancellor (VC) of University of Malaya (UM) and during his tenure as the 3rd VC, he was one of the founding fathers of Ambang Asuhan Jepun (a special preparatory programme to enter Japanese universities). He was the longest serving VC in UM, having held the position for 20 years from 1968 until 1988. Pak Ungku was also the only recipient of the Japan Foundation Award in 1981 from Malaysia and was a very significant figure in the development of JFKL since its establishment in 1989.

Malaysia has lost an education and economic icon that who had contributed greatly to the development of the nation, especially in bridging and strengthening the mutual understanding between Malaysia and Japan. His legacy will continue to live on, and his memories with us will forever be cherished. The Japan Foundation, specially its Kuala Lumpur office would like to express our sincerest condolences to the family members of Prof. Diraja Dr. Ungku Abdul Aziz. His passing is certainly a great loss to the nation and to us as well.

May he rest in peace.
