
We will be welcoming Mr. Mahen Bala for the first episode of this inaugural talk series to share about "Longing and belonging: Portraits of different people in Japan". Mahen is a Malaysian documentarian and visual artist who has worked on documenting Malaysian culture and history for more than a decade.

Title: Longing and belonging: Portraits of different people in Japan

In early 2020, I arrived in Japan on a research trip to explore railway heritage and history from the Japanese perspective. It was an opportunity to observe how train travel, museums, and railway history defined national and communal constructs of identity across the Japanese landscape. In this light-hearted talk, I will share my research findings, the places I visited, and most importantly the people I met. Among many others, I will tell you about my most treasured souvenirs and who gave them to me: the red plastic folder, the polka-dotted paper crane, and the golden manekineko from a ramen shop. After more than a year of lockdown and travel restrictions, I hope this lighthearted sharing session will remind us of the magic of connecting with strangers, and in the process, discover new insights into Japanese culture and history.



His primary interest is in investigating the human experience, and how memory shapes personal and communal constructs of history. In 2018, he published 'Postcards from the South', a comprehensive documentation of memory and history of the Malaysian railways. In 2020 he completed a Fellowship with the Japan Foundation Asia Center, and is currently pursuing his Masters at the University of Malaya.

JFKL Mini-series - Introducing Japanese Arts and Culture in Malaysia



TADOKU - A simple way to start reading

How to start TADOKU?

TADOKU (TA: a-lot, DOKU: Reading) is a reading method whereby the reader chooses a book from the vast selection of graded reading materials and discovers the joy of reading in Japanese. There are four basic rules.

- 1. Choose a book that suits your level.
- 2. No dictionary while reading. For difficult words, try to guess the meaning from the pictures.
- 3. Do not interrupt the excitement of reading. Just skip over any unknown word, phrase, or passage.
- 4. If you feel the book is tough or boring, simply quit that book and pick up another one.



There are 6 levels in Japanese TADOKU, Level 0, 1, 2, 3, 4 & 5. If you are a beginner learner who has just started to learn Hiragana (one of the Japanese writing systems), you can start at Level 0, which is the easiest level.

If you still have difficulties reading, no worries, you can start off slowly by reading along with the audio!



If you are working with people from other countries, you probably have experienced confusion or frustration. This textbook is full of of tasks to improve communication skills in diversity, which is based on the case method approach of Harvard business school to develop problem solving skills and build strong interpersonal relationships with people of different cultural backgrounds. It shares actual cases that happened in various business scenes between office staff, with clients, and so on.

Why don't you learn Japanese manners with Åsa? Åsa Ekström is a Swedish comic artist, who currently resides and works as a manga creator in Tokyo. Her curiosity in Japan has never stopped. Her latest comic is about Japanese manners which she learned from experts in each field. They teach Åsa basic manners that you should know in a daily life from greetings, table manners such as rules of chopsticks usage, honorific expression called KEIGO, all the way to Japanese etiquette. Her curiosity will allow readers to have fun learning Japanese manners. We also recommend that you read 『北欧女子オーサが見つけた日本の不思議』(That's What Åsa Found in Japan) Volumes 1-3 (TADOKU Level 4) which are available in the library as well.

Breasts and Eggs

By Mieko KAWAKAMI, Sam Bett and David Boyd (Translated)/ Publisher: Pan Macmillan 2020/ Library Call No. 895.635KAW

Mieko KAWAKAMI is one of Japan's best-selling writers and her works are highly regarded examples of the 21st century literature. This is her first full-length novel published in translation, which won the Akutagawa Prize in 2008 and was selected as the top 10 novels of 2020 by TIME magazine. As you might imagine from the title, breasts and eggs are symbols of the female body and the story is about three women, 30 year old Natsu who is single, her sister Makiko and young niece Midoriko. Intriguing conversations explore the emotional content of the female body connected to family or moral values, and quite sensitive topics are described intently with humor and sympathy such as breast enhancement surgery, fertility choice, childbirth, and motherhood.

MANGA YOKAI STORIES – Ghostly Tales from Japan By Lafcadio Hearn, Sean Michael Wilson (Retold), Inko Ai Takita (Illustration) / Publisher: Tuttle Publishing 2020/ Library Call No.387HEA

The Hungry Ghost Festival is scheduled to be celebrated at the end of August. How about reading thrilling Japanese ghost stories? Lafcadio Hearn was a writer better known as小泉八雲 (Koizumi Yakumo ,1850-1904 in Japanese modern literature, and he also contributed greatly to the introduction of Japanese culture to Western countries. This comic-style collection is a compilation of seven unique ghost stories from KAIDAN, known among the Japanese as folk tales and mythological stories collected by Hearn. The stories contain multiple elements - fear, sadness, loneliness, and even happiness. Every single story will captivate horror fans and even those who are not.

Saturday Half-Day Workshop for Japanese Language Teachers

JFKL has been organising the "Malaysia Japanese Language Education Seminar (MJLES)" annually. At the previous MJLES in March 2021, the invited speaker was Ms. OFUNE Chisato (大舩ちさと先生) on the theme of "teaching culture". This seminar successfully attracted participants from overseas and left a great impact on all of them. Therefore, to futher discuss on the theme, as well as to rethink how to relate "culture" into our own lessons, we decided to hold a follow-up workshop.

As a result, the first JFKL "Saturday Half-Day Workshop for Japanese Language Teachers" for the fiscal year 2021 was held on 29 May with the theme "How to Incorporate "Culture" into 'My' Class?" (「"私"の授業に「文化」をどう取り入れる?」).

We were glad to find that the sharing sessions were very active because most of the participants had experienced incorporating "culture" in their lessons. According to the feedback from the participants, it was very enlightening to listen to the ideas of others and they wanted to try them out in their own lessons.

In this workshop, we not only discussed about issues of incorporating "culture" into our own lessons, we also took a step further to discuss how "Artificial-Intelligence (AI) Translation" will affect the way we teach our students. This question managed to enlighten the participants to rethink about the importance of equipping their students with "intercultural" and "intracultural" comunication skills, as well as the importance of planning lessons which will equip the students with 21st Century skills.

Moving forward, JFKL will conduct more and more workshops for teachers to discuss and explore through the sharing of knowledge. We hope to see you again in our future workshops. Participants' Feedbacks

It was a relief to know that the difficulty of incorporating culture into language lessons is not unique to me but is a common problem among non-native teachers. Through the workshop, I learned how the other teachers incorporated culture into their lessons, as well as how to improve myself as a Japanese language teacher. Language and culture are inextricably liked and it is impossible to teach one without the other, so the workshop has been really helpful to my teaching career.

I was happy and really felt glad that I participated in this online training. From the sharing of teachers and JF speakers, once again ... I was able to broaden my understanding of learning by taking up culture. As a Japanese teacher, we'll not only prepare cultural materials and topics in the lesson content, but also have to think about "how and how much we understand of Japanese cultures?" "What about the background of the culture", "how to dig deeper into cultures"... which those students cannot see. It was an interesting training and enhance my knowledge and skills indeed.

The workshop conducted by JFKL really benefited me. During sharing session among participants, there are some new experiences/ information being shared which is good to adapt and adopt for my students especially. Learning a language which requires character is not the same as a language that uses the alphabet. One of the biggest challenges is to maintain student motivation since they have to characters, and to cultivate motivation teaching a culture can be incorporated into lessons which have been shared throughout this workshop. It benefited me a lot in designing my future framework in teaching. Culture can't be separated from learning the language. Thank you JFKL for giving me this opportunity!


