In 2001, she was invited to Bates Dance Festival (US) to create solo work, "Face-Mix", in a short piece of collaboration with Bates Dancers for the festival. Two years later, she created a short piece "Orchesis", for the dance company of Penn State University (US). She was also invited by the oldest dance festival of US, ADF (American Dance Festival) where she created a new short piece with ADF dancers for a main program of the festival, "International Choreographers Commission Program". Now she is also works for Shinshu-University of Japan, as a lecturer.



The Passage to Japan – Fukuzawa Yukichi
Directed by SAWAI Shin'Ichiro, 1991 / 123 min. / color

Fukuzawa Yukichi is one of the first experts on the West in modern Japan and played an important role in the modernization of late 19th century.

He has also founded Keio University in 1858, one of the most established private universities in Japan.

This film is about the life history of Fukuzawa Yukichi, one of the greatest figures of Japan.

People always complain about Yukichi of his insufficiencies during his boyhood and adolescence period. In every case, Yukichi works hard to overcome all obstacles.



After studying Dutch in Nagasaki, Yukichi is hired as a principal in a school operated by Okudaira. Later, he leaves for America to continue his study, knowing that U.S. and the West are more advanced.

Saturday, 19 February 2005 starting 4.30 p.m. Faraway Sunset – Tooki Rakujitsu Directed by KOYAMA Seijiro, 1992 / 119 min. / color

This is a film on Noguchi Hideyo, who contributed medical activities in Africa and now his portrait is appears in the new note of Japanese money of 1,000 Yen.

This story, which begins in the late 19th century, concerns the life of Noguchi Hideyo (Seisaku) who accidentally burns his hand and caused his fingers fuse together; and he becomes the butt of ridicule by others in the village. His mother, Shika still sends him to school. With her encouragement he grows up to be a



smart boy. Instead of becoming a shrimp-picker like the other men in his village, he is motivated to study medicine.

He then became a famous bacteriologist who isolated the cause of syphilis and worked hard to find a vaccine for yellow fever.

The Pale Hand – Shiroi te
Directed by KOYAMA Seijiro, 1990 / 100 min. / color



A fifth grade class in a school at a small seaside town, headed by a female teacher has five "bad boys". One day, a new student called Matsui Takakiyo from Tokyo joins the class. He suffers from a sphincter problem.

which causes him to dirty his pants whenever he becomes nervous and this incident happens on the first day at the new school. He then managed to be friend with Masaru who joins the "bad boys" in taunting

him, after Takakiyo's mother confronts Masaru.

Masaru thinks it's a bit creepy, but Takakiyo shows great interest. Soon, Masaru learns that the hand belongs to a bed-ridden young girl. Later, the feelings of the two boys have for this pale hand girl slowly begins to intertwine...

Takeshi Childhood Days – Shonen Jidai
Directed by SHINODA Masahiro, 1990/117 min./ color

This is a portrait of a friendship between a young village boy, Ohara Takeshi and a city boy, Kazama Shinji. During the World War II, as war conditions worsen with the Allied bombing of Japanese cities, Shinji have fled to his relative's home in Toyama from the city.

Takeshi, the local leader of kids his age, first approaches him. Although Shinji is uncomfortable with the life in a farmhouse, he feels Takeshi's friendship.



However, once they are at school Takeshi ignores and treats him like a stranger. In fact, everyone has a hostile attitude. Shinji can't understand Takeshi's contradictory attitude, and refuses to act like Takeshi's servant in front of the others.

"THEATRE FOR HANDICAPPED PEOPLE" PROJECT

This is a 3-years project. Ms. Manri Kim, the artistic director of the Performance Troup TAIHEN will make a visit and survey to several schools and institutions for handicapped in Malaysia from 4th until 7th of February 2005. The purpose of her visit is to set up the project for a performance by Malaysian handicapped people.

TAIHEN, the first performance art group in the world by physically disabled people, has been actively performed professionally since 1983 in Japan. Ms. Manri Kim has found that the disabled body has an expression that no one else can create. Their twisted and distorted bodies, which normally considered as ungainly, will be transformed into peculiar beauty.

This project is co-organised by The Japan Foundation, Kuala Lumpur and The Actors Studio.
