Currently, the Konnyakuza carries on approximately 250 performances a year with Hikaru HAYASHI as the artistic director, Kyoko HAGI as the music director and chairperson and 33 singers

Kuala Lumpur is the place for its world premier and it will be one of their repertoire to be toured to Thailand, Vietnam, the Philippines, Indonesia and Japan throughout.

This is the second appearance of Opera Theater Konnyakuza on Malaysian stage after their successful performance in 2003 - 'Opera Gauche the Cellist'. - The Grain of Strands from Some Moments An Exhibition of Kinetic Sculptures by Masato Tanaka


The Japan Foundation, Kuala Lumpur and GALERI PETRONAS proudly present "TOKITSUMUGI - The Grain of Strands from Some Moments" an exhibition of kinetic sculptures by Masato Tanaka from 10 April - 13 May

Showing for the 1st time ever in Malaysia from 10 April to 13 May 2007, the exhibition presents a unique display of 12 moving sculptures which combine art and technology to create free movement, dubbed a 'scenic movement presentation'. GALERI PETRONAS and the Japan Foundation present this unique exhibition to the public in celebration of Malaysia's 50th Year of Independence and 50 years of diplomatic relations between Malaysia and Japan.

Masato Tanaka's kinetic sculptures are made of materials such as steel and motor magnets, which then harness elements of nature such as wind and gravity, and even incidental movement by viewers to create an effect of natural rhythms through a range of graceful movements. The result is a mesmerizing display of sculptural beauty and graceful animation that exude from these sophisticated 21st century mobiles.

In conjunction with this exciting exhibition, several interesting public programmes have been lined-up for visitors to the exhibition, such as a special Artist Talk on Saturday, 14 April 2007 from 2pm - 3:30pm and a 'hands-on' workshop to make kinetic sculptures on 12 May 2007, from 10am - 12:30pm. Both programmes will be held at GALERI PETRONAS and are presented free of charge.

This is definitely an eye-opening exhibition for Malaysians and should not be missed.






Kangaroo Notebook


Early Japanese Images

"Ogin Her Love and Faith" Saturday, 7 April starting 4:30pm Directed by KUMAI Kei, 1978, 113min, Colour

The harbor town of Sakai was governed by a group of rich merchants including Sen no Rikyu who was Japan's most famed master of tea ceremony. He was also one of the intellectual leaders of the Hideyoshi regime. Ogin grew up in Sakai as Rikyu's adopted daughter. Passionate by nature, she falls in love with a Christian lord, Ukon Takayama, who is married. She dedicates herself to her desperate love.



"Sen Rikyu" Saturday, 21 April starting 4:30pm Directed by KUMAI Kei, 1989, 107min, Colour

Although 27 years have passed since the greatest tea master Sen Rikyu died on the order of the taikou Hideyoshi, his favourite and last disciple, Hongakubo, communicates with him daily as if he is still alive. One day, Hongakubo receives a surprise visit from Lord Oda Urakusai, who has become obsessed with the reason Hideyoshi had become so angry with Sen Rikyu nad why Hideyoshi ordered him to commit ritual suicide.







"The Yamashita Story" Saturday, 5 May starting 4:30pm Directed by MATSUBAYASHI Shue, 1985, 101min, Colour

A baby boy was born on June 1, 1957 in a small town at the foot of Mt. Aso in Kumamoto prefecture and was named Yasuhiro. Yasuhiro's grandfather, Taizo, is determined that the boy be brought up to be strong, healthy, and generous. Taizo tries hard and Yasuhiro wins the grand prize at the Kumamoto prefecture baby contest. When he is in fourth grade, Yasuhiro begins taking lessons at Fujitsubo School of Judo. He makes rapid progress, winning championships on prefectural level. He continues strenuous daily training and wins the national championship.



"Lost in the Wilderness" Saturday, 19 May starting 4:30pm Directed by SATO Jun'ya, 1986, 140min, Colour

UEMURA Naomi comes to Tokyo to go to University. He joins a mountaineering club, but not having the experiences the others do, he is forced to leave the club. He cannot find a job after graduating from university and becomes a drop-out of Japanese society. He begins to travel foreign countries with little money. He goes to US, then to Chamonix in France where he works and joins an alpine group of a university. He starts climbing several difficult mountains such as Mont Blanc and Matterhorn. In May 1978, he becomes the first Japanese climber, standing on the summit of Mt. Everest to reach the top.







Theatre Workshop in Kuala Lumpur (2~4 March 2007)

The Japan Foundation, in collaboration with Kuala Lumpur Performing Arts Centre (KLPac) organized a theatre workshop for Costume and Set Design from 2 (Fri) to 4(Sun) March 2007 at KLPac. Two renowned Japanese specialists in theatre, Mr. Sugiyama Itaru and Ms. Hatano Kazue, were invited as instructors for the three-day program. Mr. Sugiyama graduated from College of Liberal Arts, International Christian University, Japan and also the person in-charge of set design for Seinendan Company, who came to Kuala Lumpur under The Japan Foundation program last year to perform "Tokyo Notes". In 2006, he won the Best Scenography Award at International Experimental Theatre Festival in Cairo for his works on "Rutsubo". While Ms. Hatano, who graduated from Waseda University, is also one of Japan's most sought after theatre designers for set and costume. She is the founder of Society of Japanese Theatre Designers (1991) and actively involving in theatre works inside and outside Japan. She had also worked with John Bury (Head of Design) at the Royal National Theatre in London and winner of numerous local and international awards.











There were 30 participants with various backgrounds - from freelancers, students and lecturers to filmmakers and designers - who had been selected from the public. The workshop mainly focused on costume and set design and the participants were exposed to the world of performing arts from the body to the atmosphere, not only by observation, but also by mobilizing various feelings and senses. Participants had the opportunity to explore the concept of design under certain keywords, understand the concept of "place" and "space", and were asked to sketch them at the end of the three-day workshop. Most of the participants were excited to experience the feeling of "being on stage" as they were required to create a performance based on certain themes and concepts that were learnt throughout the workshop. Workshop was done, not only indoor, but also with outdoor activities including finding spaces, objects and materials.



Based on the response from the participants, the workshop had succeed to become an "eye opener" for a new approach and idea in designing set and costume for performance, not only in theatres, but also films and education at schools. They really enjoyed the sessions and had a good communication with the two instructors from Japan, which might create a broader network in the world of performing arts for both countries.



Report

Games, Anime, Comic Circle '07 By Chan Loo Mun



Building on the success of it's inaugural event last year, this year's GACC, abbreviation for Games, Anime and Comic Circle, organized by EMiNA MMU Malacca Campus, had been expanded to a two-day affair. Furthermore, it is a milestone for the Malaysian ACG event with the appearance of a well known Japanese seiyuu (voice actor), Mr Toru Furuya, best known for his roles as Amuro Ray (Gundam) and Tuxedo Mask (Sailormoon).

With planning started as early as in August 2006, we were confident that we would be able to make GACC '07 even better than before thus the committees embarked on the idea of the

invitation of a seiyuu, undeniably a dream for all ACG (Anime, Comic, Games) fans in Malaysia. It had been a joyous and wonderous moment when Aoni Production, a Japanese Seiyuu company, was interested in our invitation. We could not believe our ears when we had gotten a nod from Mr. Toru Furuya to our event.

With the days approaching, we were literally challenged with problems from each possible aspect: venue, sponsorship, vendors, manpower and etc. What pulled us through was the ever ready support given to us from our friends, family members and most importantly the belief we had from others in us. Luckily, everything went well and preparation of venue was a breeze as compared to previous year.

At the struck of 10 in the morning of 17th March 2007, we opened our doors to welcome the visitors. The admission to GACC is free and early birds are treated to goodies sponsored by Animax and Game Flier, complete with GACC event booklet.

The Opening Ceremony started with a bang having a band performance led by the President of EMiNA, Kheirul Aizat with the song 'Rewrite' from Full Metal Alchemist. Then there were speeches by Kheirul Aizat, President of EMiNA and also Yeow Li Sa, the Event Director. The event was officiated by the Multimedia University Assistant Director of Student Affairs and Sports Division, Mr. Syukor Hashim, followed by a video presentation created by GACC committee. Other VIPs of the event were Mr. Shimada Seiya, Head Cultural Affairs Department accompanied by Mr. Muhammad Hafiz bin Othman, program officer of the JFKL. During the second day of the event, we were graced by the presence of Mr Shimoyama Masaya, Director of the Japan Foundation Kuala Lumpur.

The turnout of the event was more than encouraging that by noon, the hall was jam-packed with people bustling about taking photographs, trying out games, browsing out merchandise booths and gearing up for respective competitions. Many visitors were also seen dressing up into characters from various games, manga and anime. Emcee of the event, Alfred also lived up to the expectation of entertaining the crowd every now and then, bringing the crowd to enjoy the event.

This year, GACC had once again successfully blended all the three elements, Anime, Comic and Games onto the menu and served it to the crowd of over 3000 visitors during this two-day event, mostly from KL and some from as far Singapore.

Seivuu Appearance

The main attraction for our event this year was the appearance of our special guest of honour, Mr. Toru Furuya. His appearance in our event marked the first appearance of seiyuu in South East Asia. The venue was jam-packed with visitors and Mr. Toru Furuya entertained them with much enthusiasm, making the crowd wanting for

more! First off was the talk show where he shared his experience as a seiyuu and also answered some question posed by selected fans which he finds it tricky. The 5 lucky fans even have the opportunity to take a picture with him on stage. Besides, it is very lucky for Malaysian fans that Mr. Toru Furuya willingly performed voice acting LIVE in GACC.

One of the special treats the committee arranged for him is an exclusive trip around Melaka and also a taste of all the famous culinary delights in Malaysia. His first impression of Malaysia is that it is extremely hot. As for his opinion on the food, 'Spicy but sedap!' All in all, he was glad that he was able to come to Malaysia and at the end of the day he assured that there would further opportunities for other seiyuus to come over to Malaysia ACG event.

Overall

There was a vast improvement as compared to last year event since the organizing committees had erudite in coordination with the preparation of task list and check list prior to the event. Though there were some technical glitches throughout the event, everything was able to proceed smoothly without much interference following on the tight schedule. The visitors suggested bigger venue, better air-conditioning (the hall was too packed till it was hot), more vendors and Doujins, and more seiyuus or maybe comic artists coming next time. In conclusion, the crowd were satisfied with GACC and wanted more.

Organising GACC '07 has been a long winding journey for the committees and what really pays off is when we see the satisfactory and content smile on each visitors faces. Thus, we would like to express our gratitude to JFKL, all sponsors as well as everyone for supporting GACC throughout the way.
