



CONTEMPORARY JAPANESE CRAFTS: MATERIALS AND WAY OF FORMATIVE THINKING


The Japan Foundation is pleased to co-organize this new exhibition with Galeri Petronas with support from Japan Airlines. Contemporary Japanese Crafts presents some 80 pieces by contemporary artists working in ceramics, glasswork, lacquer ware, woodwork, bamboo work, textiles and metal work. While these artists work against the backdrop of Japan's long history of handcraft traditions, the items on display include those that diverge significantly from our images of handcrafts.

According to a curator, function and decoration, although they may seem to be guite different elements, are rooted in a common ground in that they represent basic needs arising out of the daily lives of human beings. These two have been seen as the defining elements of crafts. Even today, in the making process, these are important factors influencing the creativity of the artists; they posses the power of the central theme of a work that transcends secondary qualitative factors. The efforts to identify vocabularies of form pursued since the middle of 20th century under the influence of abstract expressionism made artists in this genre appreciate anew the special characteristics of materials and techniques of crafts. Of particular interest is how constraints began to determine form, which in turn not only expanded the breadth of expression but prompted explorations in the realm of other formative arts.

In contrast to fine art, in which a growing gap has tended to develop in the purification process between concept and the act of production, it has been the nature of crafts to give a certain form to a concept using materials available in the real world, shaped with one's own hands, even while the artist is aware that their work may not rival a work of fine art. This endeavor offers a

valuable guide to exploring the universality underlying the formative arts as a whole. Along with various phenomena related the evolution of crafts, this is an issue of common interest, transcending national borders, that merit further discussion.

This exhibition features the work of 18 Japanese artists who, against the background of rich traditions of arts and crafts, have chosen fields of endeavor in which they can give expression to their inner impulses of individual creativity. Through their works the exhibition attempts to shed light on the current states of arts and crafts and its autonomy in Japan.

The exhibition will be held at Galeri Petronas from 26 March to 26 May 2002, open everyday from 10.00 a.m. to 8.00 p.m. Mondays closed.
