

The Hin Bus Depot in George Town will warrant repeat visits throughout 6–21 June as artists from Japan and Malaysia collaborate on OPEN GATE, a constantly-changing exhibition.

Directed and curated by experimental musician Sachiko M, it is the first event of its kind held in tandem with Asian Sounds Research, a component of the Ensembles Asia project by the Japan Foundation Asia Center. The group show is the culmination of two preliminary study trips, during which the organising team immersed themselves in the island's thriving art scene.

Japanese artists Tadashi Yonago and Yoshihito Mizuuchi will join their Penangite counterparts Annabelle Ng and Hoo Fan Chon in installing new creations in a shared common space. The absence of individual designated areas serves to inspire and instigate gradual transformation of each other's works. Some new pieces may emerge, some may disappear, and some may continue mutating into entirely different beasts. The exhibition's sense of unpredictability promises viewers a unique experience every time they set foot into the gallery.

A line-up of special guests has also been arranged to present performances and panel discussions every weekend. Along with the four core artists, they will make frequent appearances throughout the exhibition period outside of their own scheduled activities.

NIHONGO Partners



Since January, eight Japanese language teaching assistants have assumed their duties at several secondary schools around Malaysia.

They represent the pioneer batch of the NIHONGO Partners programme, which dispatches Japanese native speakers to 10 Asean member states; namely Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Laos, Myanmar, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand and Vietnam.

In Malaysia, participants have been stationed in both residential and day schools spread across Kedah, Perak, Pahang, Johor and Selangor. The NIHONGO Partners serve not only to facilitate language proficiency but also promote understanding of Japanese culture via learning activities in and out of the classroom. The schools will retain their support till October this year.

The programme is one of the core activities of the Japan Foundation Asia Center, a new policy for cultural exchanges announced by Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe during the 2013 ASEAN-Japan Commemorative Summit Meeting. More than 3,000 NIHONGO Partners are expected to be dispatched in the run-up to the 2020 Tokyo Olympic and Paralympic Games.

Winter Garden: The Exploration of the Micropop Imagination in Contemporary Japanese Art

After a successful run in Penang in April, the Japan Foundation travelling exhibition will make its Kuala Lumpur debut at the University of Malaya Art Gallery.

Curated by art critic Midori Matsui, the exposition features works by some of Japan's leading contemporary artists as they rearrange fragments of information and knowledge to suggest fresh ways of perceiving the outdated and commonplace.

The 35 illustrations and installations on display promise to engage viewers in new games and situations that encourage flexible communication and spontaneous actions.

Participating artists include Chim[†]Pom, Koki Tanaka, Lyota Yagi, Ryoko Aoki, Masaya Chiba, Masanori Handa, Taro Izumi, Makiko Kudo, Mahomi Kunikata, Tam Ochiai, Hiroe Saeki, Hiroshi Sugito, Aya Takano and Keisuke Yamamoto. Winter Garden started its tour at the Hara Museum of Contemporary Art in 2009. Since then, it has been held internationally in Europe, North America, Middle East and Asia Pacific; and will continue to do so till 2020.







[Confessions of a Yakuza: a life in Japan's underworld]

This is the true story, as told to the doctor who looked after him just before he died, of the life of one of the last traditional yakuza in Japan. It wasn't a "good" life, in either sense of the word, but it was an adventurous one; and the tale he had to tell presents an honest and oddly attractive picture of an insider in that separate, unofficial world.

I arrived at Toho Studios (famous for the *Godzilla and Seven Samurai* films) situated just outside Tokyo to meet Mr. Yoji Yamada, one of the living masters of Japanese cinema. At the age of 83, he was about to shoot his next feature and the interior sets for the film were being constructed.

Meeting Mr Yamada, my favourite director, was exciting enough. I couldn't believe it when he invited me to the shooting of his film! The Japan Foundation Asia Center had arranged meetings with film and animation academics as well as visits to animation museums, along with some jaunts to the old quarter of small towns. At the age of 70, I could still walk a lot but my guide, 'a young man' of 53, found it hard to keep up with me. He said that in his 30 years as a guide, he had never met anyone who loved to walk!

I was invited to speak on Malaysian cinema during the Malaysia Film Week that was incidentally being held in Tokyo. It seems Yasmin Ahmad's films are popular with many Japanese. Also participating were Orked Ahmad, Pete Teo, Sharifah Amani, Sharifah Aleysha and Ng Soon Cheong.





MEETING ACADEMIA

In Hiroshima, Kyoto and Tokyo, I met film and animation professors. I was in admiration not only of the technical facilities but also of the immense space in libraries and even cafes! Yuichi Ito and Koji Yamamura were two of the famous animators that I met at the Tokyo University of the Arts.

At Mushashino University where an old friend of mine, Prof. Kiyoshi Nishimoto, was teaching, the facilities for students to do indoor shooting for their projects were as good as those in professional studios. Not only were the students innovative, some professors that I met had even developed animation software for their faculties, with the Vice President of Hiroshima City University himself having done an art installation for a park.

VISITING MUSEUMS

The museums I visited were the Osamu Tezuka Museum (Osaka), the Suginami Animation Museum (Tokyo) and the Tora-san and Yoji Yamada Museums. Osamu Tezuka was a medical doctor who is considered as the godfather of manga and anime. He was the creator of the famous Astro Boy. The Suginami Animation Museum is run by another old friend of mine, Shinichi Suzuki, who collaborated with our very own Datuk Lat to make some animation films featuring the latter's character designs for public service films catered towards Third World countries.





Tora-san and Mr. Yamada are immortalised in the two museums for the enjoyment of younger generations who can also view the films there. Forty-eight films were made based on the character and made Mr Yamada the most prolific film director in Japan. Tora-san, with his rough but amusing ways, delighted Japanese audiences for decades. An itinerant peddler, he goes all over Japan but when he returns to his hometown, Shibamata, he creates havoc for the neighbours and his relatives who own a small shop. The late Yasmin Ahmad remarked to me that she had learnt how to write scripts by studying these films.

The Ghibli Museum in Mitaka is like an old mansion delighting both young and old with some amazing exhibitions celebrating the art of animation through Hayao Miyazaki's well-known animated characters, such as Totoro. The Museum of Motion Pictures in Onomichi – where another master of Japanese cinema, Yasujiro Ozu, is celebrated – led me to visit the locations where he had shot his masterwork, Tokyo Story (1953), one of the top five films in the last 100 years as chosen by the American Film Institute. A chance encounter with a local led me to his house and to the upper floor from where Ozu had shot the scene of a shrine.

SERENITY IN THEATRE, GRAVEYARDS AND SHRINES

In Kyoto, I witnessed kabuki for the first time live. I appreciated the

simplicity and serenity of Japan's traditional theatre. It is now being enjoyed by young people due to the popularity of a young actor, Ebizo Ichikawa XI.

For me, this feeling was carried over to the graveyards and shrines that I visited. The play of lines of stone edifices and wooden structures in Onomichi, Miyajima and Kyoto, with their parks of ornate trees and wild deer roaming the streets, transported me to the ancient days when man and nature were one. Though the sites were tourist spots, commercialism had not overcome them.

The shops and restaurants breathed art in their décor, and the conduct of people in streets and shops displayed such grace, courtesy and gentleness that it was a culture shock for me! I knew I could not expect an environment such as this back in my own country.

I will surely miss Japan!

Malaysia-Japan Film Dialogue Written by Tristan Toh, 13–14 March @ HELP University





Discerning moviegoers in the Klang Valley were treated to rare screenings of Japanese independent cinema at HELP University in March. Presented in collaboration with Kelab Seni Filem Malaysia, the event saw Lim Kah Wai and Tetsuya Mariko - two directors who have worked outside their native countries - showcase selections of their oeuvre for the first time here.

The Kuala Lumpur-born Lim screened two features; "New World", which won him Cineastes Organisation Osaka's Audience Award and Technical Contribution Award; and "Fly Me to Minami", the follow-up to his Stateless Trilogy. Both carry his mark as one of Asia's truly transnational filmmakers, featuring culturally-diverse casts in foreign settings.

Attendees got a glimpse into Mariko's early career through "The Far East Apartment" and "Mariko's 30 Pirates", two short films that

helped him win back-to-back Grand Prix at the Yubari International Fantastic Film Festival. The audience was also especially fond of "FUN FAIR", one of a three-part omnibus movie that Mariko shot entirely in Malaysia in 2012.

At the end of each day, the special guests discussed their creative and industry experiences as well as fielded questions from the floor, which comprised members of the public and local key players. Child actress Jenny Soon - who played the lead in "FUN FAIR" - joined the second day's session, moderated by film historian Hassan Muthalib.

Prior to the event, Lim and Mariko visited the Faculty of Applied & Creative Arts at Universiti Malaysia Sarawak where they provided feedback to a student production, screened their first forays into film, and spoke about their work experiences.

Kendama-shi Yusuke Ito in Malaysia

A centuries-old cup-and-ball game delighted modern audiences in March as Yusuke Ito demonstrated his magical techniques with the kendama at Tokyo Street, Pavilion Kuala Lumpur.

Kendama is a traditional Japanese toy comprising a ball attached by string to a spiked base, which holds cups of different sizes. The goal is to catch the ball in one of the cups, or spike the ball by landing its hole on the pointed end. While the premise seems simple, it takes extreme levels of precision and endurance to pull off any of the thousand variations of tricks. Kendama has recently seen a resurgence among urban youth subcultures in Europe and the United States.

As the world's only professional kendama player, Ito's skill is unparalleled. Wielding up to two kendamas at once, he effortlessly synchronised his performance to the music and still saw room to spring the occasional surprise. Ito also showed he was an able instructor, guiding children and adults alike on basic techniques at the workshops.

His visit was made all the more special by an encounter with members of a local kendama group. Ito was excited by their determination to establish a national kendama association.

"I enjoyed my trip to Malaysia and Brunei more than any of my previous overseas tours," he said. "My heart is firmly with the Malaysian people."

Each session began with a brief explanation by Senior Programme Officer Kyoko Kugai regarding the history and function of tenugui in the daily lives of the Japanese people. Participants were then guided on ways to measure their two strips of tenugui before cutting, folding and sewing them.

A total of 51 people turned up on both days, with one group coming all the way from Terengganu. All were happy with the simplicity of the process, so much so that they are confident of making their own at home! In addition to self-use, the pocket tissue cases can also be given as presents to family and friends.


