



In the time of COVID-19 pandemic, when the world and our daily lives have drastically changed, what are the thoughts of Asian authors and what are they writing about? The Asian Literature Project "YOMU" (meaning "read") organized by the Japan Foundation Asia Center will be spinning the stories of daily lives of people in Asia—their joys, hardships and resilience—through the eyes of authors in respective countries.

In collaboration with emerging writers in Southeast Asia and India, the project will post their new literary works in English, Japanese and local languages of their own. How has the act of reading itself changed as the ways people connect with each other become more varied, for instance with the increasing use of social media? The project will also feature stories and reports which illustrate diversity and vigor of reading culture in each country that richly reflects the present state of its society and culture.





OJS Special Edition 3.0 for Secondary School Students



SPECIAL EDITION 3.0 – FOR SECONDARY SCHOOL STUDENTS THEME: わたしのへやに ____ があります。/ I have ____ in my room.

Learning a second or third language may not be too complicated, but conversing in the new language can be intimidating. The Online Japanese Salon (OJS) was designed with this factor in mind, among others. These online session enables participants to talk in a monitored, casual setup with Japanese native speakers without any pressure of being graded as if taking exams.

Back by popular demand, the OJS Special Edition for Secondary School Students was held for the third time on 11 September 2021. This session was again conducted through ZOOM with more than 80 participants joining in to discuss the theme: 「わたしのへやに_____があります」or "I have ______ in my room". In the discussion, participants were asked to select an item in their room and show it to others as they described it in Japanese.

Due to the pandemic, Japanese language learners at secondary schools had limited opportunities to communicate using Japanese with their classmates. The OJS Special Edition 3.0 for Secondary School Students had participants from 27 secondary schools around Malaysia feeling encouraged to utilize the platform as a fun and interesting method for learning Japanese as mentioned in their feedbacks below:



"I got to talk with Japanese people and make new friends which made me happier. Because of the lockdown, I hadn't had a chance to talk with my friends and only got to talk with them by texting."



About OJS:

The Online Japanese Salon is a monthly event where Malaysian Japanese language learners of all levels gather online and "have fun while talking in Japanese". During the online session, the participants will be assigned to breakout rooms with peers of similar proficiency where they can communicate amongst themselves with the guidance of a Japanese native.

The Interim Report of "Online NP 2021 in Malaysia"


Since 2015, the Japan Foundation has been dispatching Japanese volunteers called NIHONGO Partners (NP) to secondary schools in Malaysia, who then act as an ambassador in Japanese language and culture learning. In 2021, NP Programme should see its seventh dispatch, but COVID-19 pandemic prevented the implementation. Due to the cancellation of 7th Batch NP Programme in 2021, JFKL has initiated an alternative called "Online NP Programme 2021 in Malaysia".

The goals of this programme are:

* To fill in the gap left by the non-deployment of NPs due to the pandemic

 \ast To continue JFKL's support to Japanese language lessons in schools via online with the involvement of former NPs.

With the cooperation of 16 former NPs who had been dispatched previously to Malaysia, 56 online activities were conducted with 21 secondary schools in Malaysia in August and September, 2021. 730 students reported through an internal survey that they truly enjoyed the interaction with former NPs through online activities and as many as 97.9% of them stated that they were satisfied with the Japan-related activities being held. Here we interviewed Mr. Masayuki Watanabe (NP 3rd Batch), one of the participants in this programme who conducted 7 online activities at 5 schools in August and September. With the cooperation of counterpart local teachers, he successfully carried out various activities such as introducing Japanese food, dance, calligraphy, and NIHONGO in everyday situations.



I wanted to feel a connection with Malaysia again and help Japanese language learners there.

2. What kind of preparation did you do before conducting certain activities with the teachers and students?

First, I prepared an activity plan where I listed down the purpose (reasons and the goals) and the class flow (methods) of the lessons. During the meeting, the Counterpart Teachers (CP, the local Japanese language teachers who collaborate with NP) and I communicated about the information and requests for the class. Then, I created a PowerPoint presentation and materials based on the completed activity plan. At our last session before the class, we went through all contents and reconfirmed the flow of the class.

3. Were there any obstacles or difficulties in carrying out the activities online?

The CPs briefed me about the students so I was able to get some ideas on what to expect, however it was challenging to prepare activities based only on assumptions. With a physical class, you can observe the class and get the general idea of the class atmosphere, and prepare activities for different kinds of students. It was more challenging for online activities because I couldn't do the same. Also, I was not familiar with some of the apps and online platforms like Google Meet and Zoom, so learning them was time consuming. However, the CPs helped me and gave me useful tips on dealing with potential problems during the online classes.

4. What is your most memorable moment during the programme?

I was impressed by the teachers' fluency in Japanese. We talked about their classes, shared about the current situation in Malaysia and Japan, and even about how they became Japanese language teacher. It touched me when students were keen during the lessons and when the CPs said they were glad to be able to practice speaking in Japanese. This programme is indeed beneficial to both teachers and students and I'm honoured to have been given the chance to participate in it.

5. Do you have a message for Japanese language learners in Malaysia?

Please do your best to do what you can to learn Japanese during the lockdown. Do what you love; watch anime and dramas, listen to Japanese music. I believe the fastest method to language learning is through personal enjoyment. Plus, be proactive to apply what you've learned! (I'll try my best to learn Malay too!) I'll support your efforts in learning Japanese!

CP's Voices

ROSLINDA BT MOHAMAD RADZI (SMK KEPALA BATAS)

This programme has increased my students' motivation to learn Japanese with the current extended PdPR. Since last May, lessons have been shifted online, and it has dampened students' dedication for elective subjects like Japanese language. I would say they were inevitable limitations conducting online activities, with students having poor internet connection and also the difficulty in gaining class materials. But students were able to communicate using basic Japanese with NP and me, and even I benefitted from this programme with the help of NP to provide a more accurate Japanese culture lesson.

NOR SAHAYU BINTI HAMZAH (SMK SEKSYEN 9, SHAH ALAM)

The biggest impact would be our opportunity to interact with native speakers of Japanese. Cultural exchange is one of the best ways in language learning, what's more to gain that experience from a native speaker. Conducting these activities online was challenging, and I believe teachers need more support to incorporate technology in their lessons and help students to overcome the changes in this new learning environment. This programme is one of the practical methods for PdPR. I hope this programme will be continued in the future.

This online programme will also be implemented in November with the aid from 12 former NPs to support Japanese language education in local schools. 31 online sessions are scheduled at 15 schools including two universities.

The 3rd JFKL Saturday Half-day Workshop for Japanese Language Teachers

The 3rd JFKL Saturday Half-day Workshop for Japanese Language Teachers, 2021 took place on 4 September via the online platform, ZOOM, with the theme "The Use of Picture: An Interesting Way to Introduce and Practice Grammar at Elementary Level" (「初級文法の 導入・練習を楽しく!~絵教材の活用~」).

The goal of the workshop was (1) to look back on how we use pictorial materials in the classroom and think about points for improvement; (2) grasp the characteristics of the pictorial materials and think about what materials to use and for what; (3) rethink about how to make use of pictures to enhance our students' communication skills.

The Workshop was attended by 44 participants. During the workshop, they were given opportunities to talk about what kind of pictorial materials they are using, as well as to discuss about the usage of pictorial material in teaching. Moreover, with guidance and explanation from the speaker, the participants tried to create self-drawn pictorial materials that suited the purpose/situation given, and experienced role-playing with some pictorial materials in order to get a better understanding of how to utilise them. It was a good opportunity for both the participants and the speaker to exchange opinions and new information.

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

The 18th International Conference on Japanese Language Education in Malaysia (ICJLEM 2021): New Attempts in **ICJLEM 2021 and Beyond**

All the programs of the 18th International Conference on Japanese Language Education in Malaysia (ICJLEM 2021) successfully ended on 9 October 2021. The three organisers, namely The Japan Foundation Kuala Lumpur (JFKL), Ambang Asuhan Jepun (AAJ) of University of Malaya (UM), and Malaysia Japanese Language Instructors Society (MAJLIS) had decided to proceed with the same format as last year by bringing this conference through online platforms once again.

Overall, there were about 100 participants mostly from Malaysia and Japan. Uploaded onto a dedicated official YouTube channel, the 12 video exhibitions of "Teacher's Corner" have been viewed 2,410 times while the 7 Poster Presentations have been viewed 534 times in total during the period shown below:

Programs

"Teacher's Corner" via video recording began in August. The videos created by the exhibitors were posted on the ICJLEM's official YouTube channel. The videos were very informative and all the exhibitors shared practical new tips and ideas that could be applied immediately for Japanese language lessons.

"Poster Presentation" via video recording started a month later, in September. We received submissions from various fields of research. On top of the video recording uploaded on YouTube, the papers of each presentation were provided on the official website beforehand in order for the audience to view and prepare for the "Live Q&A Session" on the actual conference day, 2 October.

On the morning of the conference day, more than 80 people attended the keynote lecture by Professor Dr. KOYANAGI Kaoru from Sophia University, Japan. The lecture entitled "The Role of Teachers from the Viewpoint of Learning Mechanisms of the Second Language: The Effects of Instruction and Learners' Individual Differences" gave the participants an excellent opportunity to acquire the findings of research concerning second language acquisition and to rethink about the understanding and principles often retained by Japanese language teachers when conducting lessons. The speaker also made some suggestions on how to plan a lesson based on the learning mechanisms of second language acquisition. Furthermore, the speaker emphasised what a teacher can do to motivate and encourage students in the class by understanding their individual differences.

The conference resumed in the afternoon with "Live Q & A Session for the Poster Presentation" where conference participants were given the opportunity to directly question the poster presenters.

Something new for "Teacher's Corner"

There were several new elements at this 18th edition of ICJLEM 2021.

The return of the "Teacher's Corner" was one of them. "Teacher's Corner" is a session where Japanese language teachers are encouraged to share their ideas and exchange opinions on topics related to one's daily lesson, teaching material, teaching method, and such.

It was unfortunately cancelled last year, but revived this year using a new approach, that is, sharing ideas by publishing recorded videos on ICJLEM's official YouTube channel. Previously, it was done face to face as they presented the posters. This year, it was done using by a new medium of a 3-minute video by each presenter.

There were only several videos published initially under this new approach as videos were uploaded as they were submitted from August onwards. By the end of the submission period about a month later, there were a total of 12 videos uploaded on YouTube. It was such a pleasure to read the interactions in the comment section that increased day by day. These interactions included questions, feedbacks on the idea itself and suggestions. The number of views and "Like" had also increased toward the end of "Teacher's Corner" which was 20 10 September.

On top of that, commending "Excellent Ideas" was another new component implemented for this new version of "Teacher's Corner". This year, out of the 12 videos, three were selected as " $\mathcal{I}h$ inspiring \mathcal{T} " is Inspiring Award". This additional award was presented as a special recognition for creative, innovative and fresh ideas, that may inspire others as well in their effort to enhance Japanese language education. Congratulations to the three exhibitors and we hope that this also served as a motivation for others to share their ideas in the future!

We believe that "Teacher's Corner" videos on YouTube are very convenient, and worthwhile because it allows the participants to review the videos whenever and wherever they want. They can replay them at a slower speed or even pause, if necessary, to take their time in grasping the ideas and how they can implement the ideas in their own lessons. We, the organisers of the ICJLEM, are considering whether this kind of presentation style should be continued in the next edition of ICJLEM after having seen its benefits and effectiveness in reaching its objectives.

Something new for "Poster Presentation"

Poster Presentation had some new elements as well.

Last year, it was fully conducted via recorded video on the ICJLEM's official YouTube channel. Interactions and Q&A were done using the comment section of the video only, just like the "Teacher's Corner" this year.

In addition, there was a live Q&A session with the poster presenters in the afternoon of the conference day this year. The comment section of the YouTube video was very useful but conference participants were able to commit more when they could interact directly with the presenters as well as other participants. Even though the time allocated for each Q&A session was limited, it was open to everyone at the conference and it gave ample opportunities for the participants to interact with each other actively and sufficiently.

How would it be, next year?

"I look forward to having this conference physically at the venue, hopefully next year."

This is what Dr. Zoraida Mustafa, the president of Malaysia Japanese Language Instructors Society (MAJLIS) mentioned in her remarks during the second half of the conference. This speaks for many of the participants and other stakeholders.

We are expecting to see more new elements being added at next year's ICJLEM. We hope we will be able to make good use of the knowledge and experiences gained from these two years of online conferences, and elevate the programs to another level to gain more interest from Japanese language teachers in Malaysia and overseas to participate. By joining as a presenter, exhibitor and participants, we believe that all involved in this conference can contribute to the growth of Japanese language education.

Last but not least, we would like to extend our sincerest gratitude to the keynote speaker, Prof. Dr. KOYANAGI Kaoru, the poster presenters, teacher's corner exhibitors, and all participants.

RECAP: SeaShorts 2021



The 5th SeaShorts Film Festival was held fully online from 25 August until 2 September with nine days' worth of masterclasses, workshops, and film screenings that celebrated Southeast Asian filmmakers and cinema.

The Festival's main honor, SeaShorts Award, went to Binh directed by Ostin Fam, chosen by the Competition Jury out of the 20 nominees from 8 different countries throughout the Southeast Asian region. The film depicts an alien arriving on Earth seeking assistance to rebuild his home. Arriving at a Vietnamese construction site for the biggest temple in the world, he meets several individuals exchanging their different ideas of home.

Please... See Us, directed by Chaweng Chaiyawan, was given a Special Mention. While not an award, it was bestowed to acknowledge the urgent and important message the film highlighted about the displacement of ethnic minorities in Thailand. The film followed a Lahu couple who struggled to improve the opportunities in their lives, but are caught in the grip of powerful forces around them.


