The Japan Foundation, Kuala Lumpur (JFKL) was graciously invited by the National Department for Cultural Centre and Arts (JKKN) to participate in their Cultural Diplomacy Talk which took place on the 20th of May. This talk was an academic program in which discussion and sharing of knowledge on culture took place in a holistic manner encompassing policy, constitution, education, and economy, from the perspectives of high-profile panelists.

Our director, Mr. TSUKAMOTO Norihisa served as one of the three speakers and talked on the Overview of the Japan Foundation's Activities in Malaysia. His presentation included an introduction to the WA Project 2.0, a comprehensive people-to-people exchange initiative that aims to promote exchange among the next generation and develop human resources in Japan and ASEAN. Our booth showcased the famous 'Kendama' which was a hit even amongst the VIPs who gave it a go during their booth visit. Other items displayed included a Mount Fuji backdrop prepared by JNTO, cosplay apparel, and flyers of upcoming events.

Both the Japanese Language Department and the Cultural Affairs Department of JFKL joined the Festival of Languages & Cultures 2025 at Universiti Teknologi Malaysia (UTM) Johor Bahru on 14 & 15 May.

The festival was held in conjunction with the 15th anniversary of the Language Academy, Faculty of Social Sciences and Humanities, UTM. The Opening Ceremony was graced by YAM Che' Puan Mahkota Khaleeda binti Bustamam, Pro-Chancellor of the university. During the 2-day festival, various events such as language lessons, dance performances or other workshops were conducted in many different languages.

Japanese language education at UTM has been led by the very enthusiastic Kumar-sensei, or Associate Professor Kumaraguru Ramayah, who was awarded the prestigious Order of the Rising Sun, Golden Rays with Rosette, by the Japanese government for his efforts in promoting Japanese language education in Malaysia last year. Following the success of the first Japanese Studies Essay Contest and Mentorship Programme in 2024, the second edition of this contest has already begun with a call for abstracts from eligible students in the undergraduate and postgraduate categories (Submission closed as of 8 June).

To reminisce on the first batch of mentees who worked tirelessly with their mentors to complete their essays, JFKL spent some time checking in with last year's winners to find out what they've been up to this year.

Our first-place winner, Ms. Aina Darwisyah has now graduated from Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) and is currently seeking employment that best suits her field as a translation major. Recalling her challenges during her mentorship programme, Aina shared that she was in Japan for the Japanese-Language Program for Counterpart Japanese Learners (University Students) Fall Program during the last stage of completing her essay. Despite the limited time, she was grateful that her mentor, Dr. Rokiah Paee trusted her to work independently and then reviewed her essay once it was done to ensure she was on the right track. She advises anyone who is interested to "Just do it!"

Our second-place winner, Mr. Ahmad Mahmood from Universiti Malaya (UM) was busy wrapping up his final year dissertation for submission titled, "Malaysian Tokusatsu Fans' Continued Consumption of Japanese Tokusatsu Without Official Distribution", which was also his topic for the essay contest. He recommended those who are interested in participating this year to choose a topic that truly resonated with them. In addition, he stated that the knowledge they had learned throughout their studies or personal interests would be of great use in terms of idea generation, motivation, and even in mapping out the essay they wish to write.

Last but not least, our third-place winner, Siti Alia Munirah from Universiti Putra Malaysia (UPM) was happy to correspond with us despite being hands on as an assurance intern at PricewaterhouseCoopers (PwC). Referencing her LinkedIn post, she had joined the contest without any expectations, so being shortlisted was a pleasant surprise. She recalled that her mentor, Dr. Mohd Ikbal Mohd Huda from Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia (UKM) guided her throughout the process for a meaningful experience overall. She encouraged others to participate to gain valuable experience but also to expand networks as a young student. In addition, she shared "Beyond all the theory, just submit your abstract! If you're interested or even slightly curious, go for it. What are you waiting for? Opportunities like this don't come twice, so don't overthink it. You never know how far it could take you until you try."

JFKL wishes all of our past mentees well in their future endeavors and have high hopes that they will help cultivate the next generation of scholars in the field of Japanese Studies.

For this year, JFKL is co-organizing this event with the Malaysian Association of Japanese Studies (MAJAS) as well as the Faculty of Social Sciences and Humanities, Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia (UKM).

Murakami's long-awaited new novel, 「街とその不確かな壁」 has finally been released in Japan, 6 years after "Colorless Tsukuru Tazaki and His Years of Pilgrimage", and its English translation version was published.

The story starts with a nameless young couple: a boy and a girl, teenagers in love. One day, she disappears, and her absence haunts him for the rest of his life. In the afterword of the novel, Murakami mentions "Truth is not found in fixed stillness, but in ceaseless change/movement. Isn't this the quintessential core of what stories are all about?"

His iconic tropes, lost love, loneliness, missing women, and other realities along with his comforting leitmotifs, namely cats, jazz and classical music, and beloved books can still be found. You will enjoy exploring Murakami's astonishing parallel world.

Kodomo no Hi - Children's Day in Japan is celebrated annually on 5th May throughout Japan to honour children's growth, happiness, and well-being.

With the slogan "Let's Celebrate Kodomo no Hi Together!", JFKL Library organised a Kodomo no Hi Stamp Rally on 10 May for the first time as part of the cultural exchange between Malaysia and Japan.

On the day of the event, we had approximately 65 participants joyfully celebrating while exploring Japanese cultural activities. It was a lovely atmosphere filled with happy smiles of children in the library, everyone seemed to have enjoyed exploring cultural activities with their family and friends.

Stamp Rally is a popular activity in Japan where participants visit different stations to collect stamps on a card and win a reward. On the day, we prepared five stations where participants explored Japanese cultural activities - Origami, Kirie (paper cutting art), Furoshiki (wrapping clothes experience), traditional toys corner, and Washitsu (Japanese style room) session. The participants merrily went around each station to collect five Hiragana scripts spelling out おめでとう(Omedetou), which means "Congratulations" in English.

Thanks to our volunteer instructors at each station, many children looked very excited at discovering new experiences, folding Kabuto (Samurai armour helmet) with origami, making playable origami, such as jumping frog and Koma (Spinning Tops), playing with traditional toys like Kendama and Koma, learning some simple Japanese manners, and so on.

With cheerful voices the children interacted with the instructors, "I did it! I want to fold more Origami!" "How can I play Kendama?" "I want to challenge myself until I can spin well", and their positive attitude was impressive and inspiring.

Additionally, we provided a dress-up corner for a familiar Japanese festival costume, the Happi. The participants enjoyed trying it on for Instagrammable photos with our colorful displays of KOINOBORI (carp-shaped streamers) and the KABUTO (samurai helmet and armour) as

Officially launched mid-February, the Japanese Speech Contest for Secondary Schools in Malaysia, or JSC, targeted at Malaysian secondary school students between the ages of 15 and 18. The participation is open to:

- (a) those who are learning Japanese as a subject in their public secondary school; and
- (b) those who are learning Japanese in an institution other than secondary school.

By closing of submissions on 16 March 2025, JFKL had received a total of 127 speeches from 48 different schools, which was the highest ever in 22 years of implementation. This year, we featured 14 finalists competing on stage reflecting the theme, "Щ", or mountain.

Some of our sponsors had the chance to offer their products at booths set up in the venue, where the guests, audience, and contestants could enjoy them. Thank you very much to all our sponsors, judges, and the Ministry of Education Malaysia.

Malaysia Japanese Language Education Seminar (MJLES)

The Malaysia Japanese Language Education Seminar (MJLES) took place online via Zoom on 8 March 2025 (Sat), from 9:00a.m. to 12:00p.m., bringing together 89 participants from across Malaysia, Indonesia, Japan, Singapore, Thailand, and Vietnam.

This year's theme was "When to use that certain expression?: Capturing the grammatical points that lead to learners' practical language usage" (Japanese: その表現はいつ使う?- 運用力につながる文法の捉え方 -). The speaker was Dr. OTA Yoko (太田陽子先生), a professor at Hitotsubashi University in Japan and a leading expert in Japanese language education. She holds a PhD in Japanese Language Education from Waseda University and has a rich experience teaching Japanese language at various universities. Her expertise in grammar instruction and teacher training brought a wealth of insight to the session.

The seminar focused on how grammar can help learners use Japanese in real-life situations. Dr. Ota explained that while modern language instruction often centres on "Can-do" goals, grammar still plays an important role. She encouraged teachers to look beyond traditional grammar instruction and connect it more closely with practical communication. One example highlighted in the seminar was the grammar of receiving expressions: -te kureru and -te morau (both of which mean "to receive" in Japanese but are used for different perspectives). Using examples from authentic language data, Dr. Ota demonstrated why teaching these expressions in isolation is insufficient, and how a deeper understanding of grammar contextually can help learners use Japanese more naturally. Participants found the seminar clear, practical, and inspirational.

In summary, the seminar provided a valuable platform for Japanese language educators across the region to engage with new ideas, connect theory with practice, and rethink how grammar can be taught in the classroom. This annual seminar will return with a new theme in March 2026. See you again!





Online Study Group for Japanese Language Teachers in Secondary School

This programme was designed for secondary school Japanese language teachers in Malaysia and aims to explore teaching methods, materials, and classroom activities that enhance students' communication skills in Japanese and their intercultural understanding. It also aims to create a space for teachers to share their practices and exchange ideas on specific themes.

The 1st Session on 24 April 2025 (Thu) @ 15:00-16:30

Theme: Let's take a look at the workbook for Form 4 $\&\,5$

We looked at the workbook created by JFKL and thought together about usage situations for sentence patterns, ways to adapt practice activities, how to check answers, and key points to keep in mind.

The 2nd Session on 20 May 2025 (Tue) @ 15:00-16:30

Theme: <Lesson 3, 8 & 13> Important teaching points and class activities

We looked at Lessons 3, 8, and 13 of the Japanese language textbook, "Bahasa Jepun Menengah Rendah (Tingkatan 1-3)", and considered key teaching points and classroom activities.



Through this programme, teachers who usually teach Japanese at different schools are able to come together regularly online to exchange information and ideas. The next online study meeting is scheduled for 24 June 2025 (Tue).





JFKL Workshop for Japanese Language Teachers 2025/2026

The first workshop took place on Saturday, 24 May 2025, with the theme:

"Teaching methods and classroom activities to support learners in developing self-directed Kanji learning strategies from the beginner level." We were also happy to host this session physically at JFKL!

The speaker, Ms. HIRATA Yuna, guided participants through ways teachers can help learners develop self-directed kanji learning strategies from the beginner level. The workshop began with a review of basic kanji knowledge. Participants then experienced classroom activities focused on four key aspects of kanji learning: shape, reading, meaning, and usage. Through the workshop, everyone reflected on the purpose of each activity and how they could apply them in their own classrooms.

The workshop was attended by 20 participants. Below are some of the feedback we received:

"I learned some fun games for studying kanji. It was fun to try them, and I saw that learning kanji can be enjoyable."

"I didn't know there were different ways to look at kanji. I'm glad I learned about this. The teacher explained the method clearly and step by step in a fun way, which helped me understand better."

"I learned about the 'ごいマップ' (vocabulary map). It was very fun and helped me connect many related kanji easily."

"I got many good ideas. I'm happy to know there are activities that even beginners can do when learning kanji."
