Comic Art Festival Kuala Lumpur 2025 – Special Guests KURATA Yoshimi, NITOU Subaru & RYOSUKE Goto

The 9th edition of CAFKL took place in Fahrenheit 88 from the 31st of May to 1st June. JFKL, in collaboration with NPO Asia MANGA Summit, brought in guest artists from Japan, KURATA Yoshimi and NITOU Subaru. Kurata-sensei is the artist of *Aji Ichimonme* (Original story by Zenta Abe), a popular Japanese culinary manga that began serialization since 1987 and is still ongoing today! While Nitou-sensei is the artist behind the *Obey Me! The Comic* and creator of *EVIL SCHEME*. They were also joined by RYOSUKE Goto, Deputy Editor-in-Chief for the Kansai Division of Mag Garden and Nitou-sensei's editor.

They held meet-and-greet sessions and portfolio reviews at the event where fans got to meet the artists and also get feedback on their works, both from an artist's and an editor's perspective.

Kurata-sensei held the Storytelling in Comics panel, where he shared his inspiration. He spoke about utilizing panel division and spatial awareness to craft his story. He also shared about using artificial intelligence in his process.

Meanwhile, Nitou-sensei and Mr. Ryosuke held a panel about the mutual relationship between a manga artist and an editor, from providing objective support to managing expectations, being consistent and reinterpreting established IPs. Nitou-sensei also had a live art demo during the session. Nitou-sensei even went around to exchange souvenirs with attendees at the event!

Another panel, titled *Comic Editors, a Japanese & Malaysian Perspective*, where editor Ryosuke and Fey, Chief Editor of the English Editorial at KADOKAWA GEMPAK STARZ discussed the differences in the working culture and process in their respective country. Both sides discussed the spread of webtoons, the strengthening of Malaysia's manga culture, local censorship, marketability of works and the need for professional support for creators. Both agreed on the importance of nurturing newcomers and cultivating local creative ecosystems. Each panel ended with a Q&A from the attendees.

Additionally, Kurata-sensei attended the entrance ceremony at Nippon Designers School Malaysia College, offering words of encouragement to new students, followed by a portfolio review session of works by over 20 students for one-on-one feedback. Specific advice was given for the students to further improve their craft.











AniManGaki 2025 – Special Guests from Orange and KOTOBUKIYA

AniManGaki 2025 has come and gone. From the 22nd to 24th of August, JFKL brought several special guests from Orange, the animation studio known for creating popular CG animations such as *BEASTARS*, *TRIGUN STAMPEDE*, *LEVIATHAN* and many more. Representing the studio was producer WATANABE Yoshihiro, director MUTO Kenji, illustrator AMANO Yumihiko and mechanical designer KATAGAI Fumihiro. The team had a meet-and-greet session with fans of the *TRIGUN STAMPEDE* series, along with having the *Orange Presents: Designs of Trigun Stampede* and *Orange Presents: Masterworks of Kotobukiya, Featuring Trigun Stampede* panel at the AniManGaki Sidequest Stage. Fans got to see the inspirations and behind-the-scenes from the team that brought their favorite series to life. They were even treated to a live drawing of their favorite characters by Mr. Amano!

Sculptor HATTORI Tatsuya and sales team representative Zhansaya Baigaziyeva, representing KOTOBUKIYA also shared about sculpting for characters from the series, the challenges and uniqueness of each character and how sculpting has evolved with 3D software. Ms. Zhansaya also took the opportunity to research the local market for character sculptures, hoping to expand to the region.

On the 25th, The team hosted a special sharing session for students at Nippon Designers School Malaysia College to talk about the industry, work roles and careers. The students had a chance to share their work via a portfolio review and get professional input from the team.

The team were also left impressed by the outspoken nature and advanced talents of the students, hoping that they will continue to contribute to the industry.

We hope that the team has drawn inspiration from Malaysian culture (and food!) for their next work and know that there are plenty of fans in this corner of the world!













Ipoh International Art Festival 2025 (IIAF 2025)

IPOH INTERNATIONAL ART FESTIVAL 2025 (IIAF 2025) was held from 19 July to 3 August at PINCER, Ipoh. This annual festival organized by PORT (People of Remarkable Talents) is a celebration of mainly visual arts and music which PORT has been promoting strongly through various programs over the years. Among the invited guests from other parts of Malaysia and overseas, a Japanese contemporary artist Ms. YASUDA Yoh was also invited to showcase her works at the festival.

Before heading to Ipoh for the setting up of the exhibit, Ms. Yasuda visited some art-related institutions in Klang Valley such as Ilham Gallery, Rimbun Dahan, Cult Gallery, The Zhongshan Building and so on to gain knowledge on the art scenes here.

She also had a little bit of time to explore Ipoh and conduct a kite-making workshop before heading to PINCER, the venue of IIAF 2025. The workshop was held at Kapallorek Artspace located in Seri Iskandar. About 15 participants of this workshop of artistic kite were mostly art students from UiTM Seri Iskandar, and everyone seemed to have great time learning the technic of kite making as well as creating their own kite as artwork.

While it was unfortunate for Ms. Yasuda since she was unable to exhibit her huge kites in various shapes as she has done in Yogyakarta and Bali before, but we believe that it turned out to be the opportunity to get to know about Malaysia as well as to introduce her works to Malaysian institutions and individuals for future possibilities.





Traditional Japanese Baren-Making Workshop Reported by Hannah Hir (JFKL)

In conjunction with the 3rd edition of the Asian Master Series, master printmaker FUNASAKA Yoshisuke had his solo exhibition in Malaysia, titled Intipati, organised by The Japan Foundation, Kuala Lumpur (JFKL), Museum of Asian Art, Universiti Malaya (UM) in cooperation with Akaldiulu. In addition to the exhibition, a three-day traditional Japanese baren-making workshop was held for printmaking practitioners led by the artist himself.

"The combination of woodblock and silkscreen techniques with the elements of empty spaces in FUNASAKA's works perhaps show the philosophy where imperfection holds beauty and meaning," - noted Juhari Said, a former student of the prolific printmaker whose work is featured at many major museums, including the Smithsonian Institution.

This time at UM's Museum of Asian Art, over 90 of FUNASAKA's artworks were exhibited and has been cycled twice during the period of the exhibition. The exhibition continues cycling the 241 works FUNASAKA has generously donated to the museum.

Attended by Deputy Vice Chancellor of Student Affairs (UM), Professor Dr Zamri Radzi and Mr. KITAOKA Tatsuya, a representative of the Ambassador of Japan in Malaysia, the opening ceremony of the exhibition had successfully marked an important chapter in elevating contemporary Asian art.

The workshop offered participants the opportunity to learn the intricate craftmanship of traditional Japanese baren making, focusing on patience and precision, where participants meticulously braided strips of bamboo skin into a rope of 14 meters as the first step in their baren making. The braided cords were then coiled onto a disc and veiled with a bamboo sheath. Only then were the barens used in hand over a paper-covered block to transfer inked images.

JFKL hopes to bring in many more opportunities such as these as means of strengthening international visual art collaborations and advancing the education of Asian printmaking in Malaysia.









Workshop on Cyberbullying in ASEAN-Japan for Global Day of Parents

On 25 June 2025, Taylor's University Lakeside Campus, School of Law & Governance, together with The Japan Foundation, Kuala Lumpur (JFKL), co-hosted the second part of a three-part workshop series on cyberbullying. Held in conjunction with the Global Day of Parents, the session highlighted the shared responsibility of families and communities in creating a safer digital environment for children.

The workshop opened with remarks from JFKL Director, Mr. Tsukamoto, who stressed the urgency of digital safety for children in today's world. Dr. Aditya Yuli Sulistyawan of Diponegoro University, Indonesia, presented thought-provoking case studies and a comparative review of cyberbullying laws in Indonesia, Malaysia, and Japan. His talk was complemented by Dr. Mogana from Taylor's University, who shared valuable perspectives from Japan's academic and legal context.

The most heartwarming part of the event came during group discussions. Participants from MCMC officials to NGO workers, educators, and parents, shared their stories, concerns, and creative solutions drawn from their own experiences. Listening to diverse voices gave the discussions a personal and inspiring touch. Three groups were recognized for their insightful ideas on how parents can respond effectively to cyberbullying.

With the success of this session, the final part of the series is eagerly anticipated in November 2025! Stay tuned.

Placemaking Study Trip to Indonesia 25 – 30 May 2025

Building up on the well-received first run of the Placemaking Exchange programme in 2024, the Japan Foundation Kuala Lumpur (JFKL), in collaboration with Placemaking Malaysia (PMM), the Malaysian Institute of Planners (MIP), and Pollin8 joined hands once again with a shared mission to continue spreading awareness on the concept of 'placemaking' and its best practices to transform spaces into community driven places, uniting local communities from different regions.

As part of our second-year initiative, an elite delegation comprised of returning placemakers and local councils joined the co-organizer's team to embark on a Placemaking Study Exchange Trip to Indonesia from the 25th to 30th of May 2025. The delegation included the co-founder of Taman Negara Kita as well and representatives from Dewan Bandaraya Kuala Lumpur (DBKL), Majlis Bandaraya Petaling Jaya (MBPJ), and Majlis Bandaraya Seberang Perai (MBSP) who have been active supporters of the Placemaking Exchange programme.

The five-day exchange began in Jakarta and travelled to Bandung with a series of essential placemaking activities such as site visits, workshops, symposium and networking with local students, community leaders and honourable local city councils, in courtesy of the kind arrangements made by Placemaking Indonesia led by Dr.Widiyani and her dedicated team; Mr. Angga, Ms. Aishah and a Master's student from Institut Teknologi Bandung (ITB).

The first leg of the journey took place in Jakarta, where participants were introduced to the residents of Kampung Susun Kunir, followed by an intimate visit to Met Glodok, and a walkathon around Kota Tua Jakarta. The residents organized an engaging 'rujak' making session to honour their community's collective efforts since being evicted from Kampung Kunir to their now low-rise housing complex. Met Glodok's founder, Ms. Metta Setiandi gave a powerful and emotional presentation on her mission to revive the Met in memory of her Chinese Indonesian heritage through cuisine, culture and community.

In Bandung, the site visit began with a walk at Karasa, Gempol Kulon where Mr. Andi reimagines forgotten back alleys into interactive vibrant places which significantly reduces crime rates. Then, the delegation visited The Hallway Space, an innovative creative market hub for local brands built inside a humble local market. Cicendo Microlibrary and Taman Film were also wonderful placemaking spaces that benefited the surrounding community.

The trip's main case study was Teras Chihampelas, once a bustling elevated walkway where visitors shopped and admired panoramic views of Bandung. Designed to ease traffic and boost vibrancy, it has struggled since the pandemic, leaving only a few stalls in operation. To better understand the challenges, participants conducted site inspections guided by local authorities before splitting into groups to brainstorm revitalisation ideas using the "Place Game" method to develop creative, locally tailored solutions.

Following group discussions, the delegation presented their findings at a Mini Placemaking Symposium ITB with the attendance of Bandung's Deputy Mayor who had a chance to engage with Malaysia's local councils on revitalizing Teras Chihampelas by incorporating Placemaking practices.


The study trip was not only informative but also light-hearted and engaging. It offered a rare opportunity for Malaysia, Indonesia, and Japan to learn from one another, exchange ideas, and strengthen bonds through shared experiences. Beyond the case studies, what stood out most were the human connections, stories told, friendships formed, and the shared vision of building inclusive, people-centred places.


And the journey does not stop here. This December, we will be holding our Placemaking Symposium at PJPAC. Do look forward to it!



One of our most popular annual events, Japanese Film Festival (JFF) throughout Malaysia, which celebrated its 20th anniversary with Malaysian audience last year, features acclaimed films every year. Dr. Teck Fann Goh who is a lecturer in Arts and Cultural Management at the University of Melbourne provides a new perspective for understanding film festivals as sites of cultural diplomacy with the first full-length study of long-running Japanese film festivals in the Asia-Pacific region from the late 1970s until 2020. Through case examples in Australia, Malaysia and Thailand, the book explores how the formation and recent developments of JFFs in the region reflect wider changes in the function of Japanese cultural diplomacy through films, particularly with the intensification of economic, cultural and diplomatic opportunities presented in this geopolitical space.

Hakuhodo Foundation: The 15th Japanese Language Exchange Program (2024-2025)

What happens when 30 teenagers from 10 countries are brought to Tokyo, often without a shared language? Magic.

In May 2025, four students from SM Sung Siew (CF) Chok Mit Ker, Gwee Jia Hong, Javier Jackson, Nayli Maisarah and their sensei, Janikah joined the 15th Hakuhodo Japanese Language Exchange for a 14-day cultural immersion. Mornings involved practical language lessons - ordering ramen, asking for directions. Afternoons were a cultural bootcamp: traditional dance, karuta card games, and Sports Day races filled with laughter and new friendships.

The deepest bonds formed during homestays in Kawasaki and Shizuoka with host families. Students shared sushi and wagyu dinners alongside their host families, sang karaoke, and built connections beyond words. A visit to a local school revealed mutual curiosity - Malaysian students performed the Sumazau dance, while Japanese students joined in with Soranbushi.

The program closed with emotional speeches in Japanese, "この日本語交流は私をとても幸せな気持ちにさせてくれました。みなさんは優し くて、紳士な友達です。活動も楽しくて、面白かったです。" which expresses joy and gratitude for the kind friends and unforgettable experiences.

The real lesson? Language isn't just spoken—it's lived.









Report: Regional Training for Japanese-language Secondary School Teachers (J-RETRA 2025)

This year, the Regional Training for Japanese-language Secondary School Teachers (J-RETRA2025) was held in Penang, Johor, and Kuala Lumpur, bringing together a total of 76 secondary school Japanese language teachers from across Malaysia (Penang: 25, Johor: 18, Kuala Lumpur: 33).

The objectives of the training were to explore effective teaching strategies and classroom activities, exchange ideas and strengthen professional networks, and focus on methodologies for communication skills, intercultural understanding, and student-centred learning.

Revolving around themes such as fostering cross-cultural understanding, task-based language teaching, kanji and essay instruction, and a hands-on furoshiki workshop, the program offered teachers both practical strategies for Japanese language education and valuable opportunities to deepen their cultural knowledge.

Feedback collected from all three venues revealed that participants particularly appreciated the chance to exchange ideas with colleagues and gain fresh inspiration to apply in their own classrooms. This allowed them to see diverse teaching practices and adapt new approaches for their students. Many felt encouraged to try task-based activities, new techniques for kanji instruction, and creative ways to guide essay writing. Beyond pedagogy, the program also fostered a sense of community and shared purpose, strengthening professional connections across different regions.

We would like to express our heartfelt gratitude to the Kamenori Foundation for sponsoring J-RETRA2025. Their generous support made this program possible and continues to play a vital role in the growth of secondary school Japanese language education in Malaysia.

Japanese-Language Programs for Counterpart Japanese Learners of the Nihongo Partners Program FY2024-2025 by Kansai Centre Reported by Nur Diyana binti Abd Rahman (JFKL)

The Japan Foundation Japanese-Language Institute in Kansai (also known as Kansai Centre, KC) launched a new program in Fiscal Year (FY) 2024 dedicated for Japanese language learners of high schools and universities - targeting the institutions that were involved with Nihongo Partners Program locally. This new initiative is intended to develop Japanese-language proficiency and communication skills, to deepen the understanding of Japanese culture and society, as well as to strengthen their competencies in order to sustain a wholesome global society in the future.

Involving not only Malaysians, the 44-day program for university students is also targeting Taiwan, People's Republic of China, Indonesia, Cambodia, Singapore, Thailand, Timor-Leste, the Philippines, Brunei, Vietnam, Myanmar, Laos and India. The program for high school students between the age of 15 – 18 on the other hand is targeted for students from Malaysia, Taiwan, Indonesia, Thailand, the Philippines, Vietnam and Laos for 16 days.

In general, the program focuses on themes related to Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) through its activities including lectures on Japanese language, culture and society, study trips to education institutions, historical and cultural sites, exchange program with local institutions, as well as cultural experience activities. As a post-program assignment, participants are required to share their experiences in joining the program with their local community and their future goals.

11th Batch NIHONGO Partners Mid-Term Activities Recap

NIHONGO Partners Program 11th Batch Activities Recap.

Since 11th batch NIHONGO Partner(NP) was dispatched to their respective school from March 6th, various activities have been conducted on several occasions. Together, let us revisit some of the highlights of the Activities conducted.

Highlight 1 : SMS Miri Japanese Language Camp.

The Japanese camp (J-camp) was successfully organized at SMS Miri from 27 until 29 June 2025, thanks to the initiative of the school's Counterpart Teacher (CP) and NP. A total of 10 NP and 117 passionate students from 8 schools around Malaysia participated in the 3-days camp.

On day 1, the students started their camp with a placement test to determine their Japanese language level. Then, they were greeted by a special Yosakoi performance by the NP, before proceeding to the ice-breaking session for the rest of the day. The students were placed into mixed groups with their peers from different schools and played team-building games such as plastic-bottle "Kendama", "Daruma-san ga Koronda" and "Fukuwarai" with the assistance of NP in each group.

Their second day started early with "Radio Taiso" Exercise session led by NP to keep students refreshed, before starting their grind on reading comprehension and grammar lesson. Later in the day, the students were tasked to prepare Japanese cuisine dinner guided by the NP such as Curry Rice, "Ohagi" (glutinous rice dessert) and "Tempura" (battered, deep-fried vegetables). After having their hearty dinner with the NP and teachers, the students continued their writing lesson (Sakubun) for the rest of the night.

On the final day, the students dived into early morning lesson on Japanese particles and made it to the end of the 3-day intense study session. The camp was concluded with a splendid Closing Ceremony; in which the groups competed in the Yosakoi dance and Storytelling (Kobanashi) competition. The students took this chance to don their beautiful traditional attire and celebrated each other's achievements with mutual respect. We would like to express our thank you to the NP for dedicating their time and energy in making the camp successful and we hope that aside from improving their Japanese language, the students were also able to make many new friends hence deepen their interest towards Japanese language and culture.

I will never forget the joy on teachers' faces when we could finally resume in-person teacher training through J-RETRA in 2022, after two years of online-only activities.


